Apple supply decreases

HARRISBURG - Pennsylvania apples in cold storage on Dec. 31 totaled 168,618,000 pounds, down 49,095,000 pounds or 23 percent from a year ago, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

Of that total, York Imperial apples comprise the largest variety in cold storage for fresh market and processing at

52,108,000 pounds. They are followed by Golden Delicious apples at 31,757,000 pounds, Rome apples at 28,476,000 pounds and Red Delicious apples at 22,973,000 pounds.

Apples in cold storage in the continental United States on Dec. 31 totaled 2,676,487,000 pounds, down 568,091,000 pounds or about 17 percent from a year ago.
