Scholarship deadline nears

LANCASTER — April 23 is the deadline for submitting applications and other necessary materials for the 1982 Lancaster County Farm and Home Foundation Scholarship Awards.

Depending on the financial need and ability of applicants, up to a maximum of 20 scholarships in the amount of \$750 each will be announced by May 18.

The scholarship award may be used to help defray tuition, fees or room and board expenses at any accredited college by students in the fields of agriculture, home economics and nursing.

Senior students in public and non-public high schools in Lancaster County or county residents who have completed high school training are eligible.

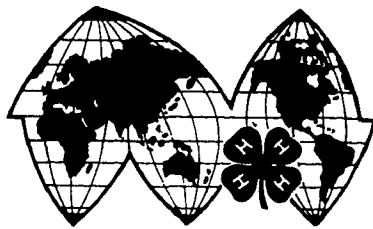
