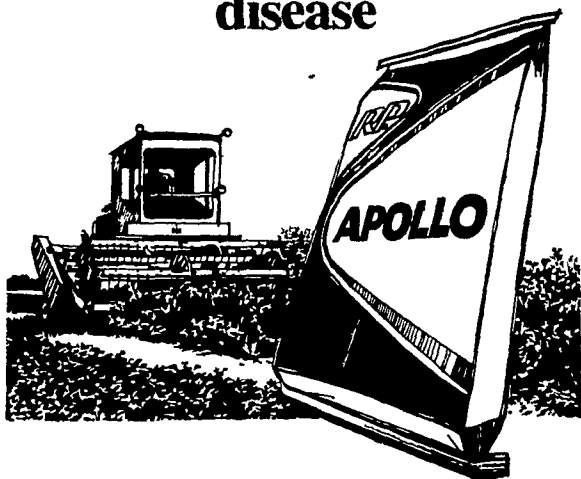
mixed well. Remove cake from oven and put holes in it with fork or pencil right away. Pour can of coconut creme over entire top,
