The directors also gave final approval to a series of organizational changes and bylaws amendments that will become fully effective in 1983. Major changes include reductions in the size of the board of directors (from maximums of 51 to 25) and the executive committee, elimination of the office of vice chairman, a new dues schedule and formulas for funding of special projects and creation of a new board of delegates.

Under that structure, the board of delegates — through which voting rights of members will be exercised — will elect the board of directors and recommend positions on programs and

operations. The smaller board of directors will assume greatly increased responsibility for direction of the organization, although the executive committee will continue to be appointed by the board and to direct the staff. Standing committees on both programs and organizational matters will advise the boards.

The agriculture Council of America is an organization of producers, farmer-owned cooperatives, agricultural associations and local and national agriculture-related businesses. It serves as a forum for uniting agricultural interests on solutions to problems of common concern and a source of factual, consumeroriented information about modern agriculture.
