

Penn Manor Young Farmers honor top members

MILLERSVILLE — The Penn Manor Young Farmers honored top members who were winners in the 1981 corn production contest and elected officers at the chapter's annual banquet last Thursday night at Millersville's High School.

Approximately 180 people, including members and their families, agribusiness personnel and guests attended the banquet.

Among the new officers elected that night — although not officially announced till Tuesday — are: Phil Shertzer, president, from R2 Lancaster; Rick Burkholder, vice president from Washington Boro; Glenn Rohrer, secretary from R2 Lancaster; Earl Newcomer, treasurer from R1 Washington Boro; and Cliff Charles of R2 Lancaster, Elvin Hess of Conestoga, and Hen Barley of R2 Lancaster for the planning committee.

Among the three top winners for the corn production contest are:

— Cliff Charles of R2 Lancaster. Charles is in a partnership with his father Abram Charles, farming 125 acres and operating a farrow-to-finish operation with 135 hogs. They also have 100 beef cattle. Charles planted Pioneer 3184 with a total of 186.21 bushels per acre.

— Hen Barley of R2 Lancaster. Barley runs a poultry and beef operation with 100,000 pullets and 160 cattle. Barley earned second place with two fields: Cargill 967 at 175.16 bushels per acres, and Cargill 924 at 174.25 b/a.

— Don Witmer of Rl Washington Boro. Witmer's operation consists of 100 steers; 280 acres, 27 of which are in tobacco; and 18,000 breeder pullets, twice a year. Witmer planted Pioneer 3184 also with a total of 174 b/a.

Others recognized for their results in the contest were: Elias

Groff, Pioneer 3331 at 173 b/a; Elmer Sensenig, Pioneer 3184 at 165.23 b/a; Bob and Dick Neff, Pioneer 3184 at 162 b/a; Bob Noll, Pioneer 3184 at 163 b/a; and Glen Burkholder, Dekalb XL71 at 163.04 b/a.

Approximately 30 farmers participated in this corn contest with a total of 38 fields.

Another special presentation, in the form of a \$20 gift certificate, went to Jeff Hart who has been the Young Farmer's advisor for the past two years.

During the presentation, Charles announced that membership totals 100 members, up from 15 only two years ago.

Guest speaker for the evening was Keith Eckel, president of the Pennsylvania Farmer's Assn. The Bluegrass Jug Band provided entertainment.
