## U.S. judge dismisses dairy co-op's suit

District Court dismissal of an antitrust suit, ended a seven year courtroom battle between Fairdale Farms, Inc. of Bennington, Vermont and the Regional and a "reasonable price," Freyer Cooperative Marketing Agency, explained. From 1973-75, RCMA Cooperative Marketing Agency, Inc. of Syracuse.

In 1975, Fairdale Farms, Inc. charged RCMA and one of its million. members, Yankee Milk, Inc. now Agrı-Mark, Inc., with raw milk price fixing and monopoly, said RCMA attorney John M. Freyer.

Federal Judge Albert W. Coffin, in his decision held "that because plaintiff raises no genuine issue as to any fact material to the question of whether defendants engaged in predatory conduct, the defendants are entitled to judgement as a matter of law."

Freyer said the charges were a result of "over order" pricing in the New England order during 1973 to 1975. He said at that time, Federal Order prices were going down and farmers were caught in a cost-price squeeze.

The RCMA was organized in 1973, by cooperatives in the Nor-

> "The right of cooperatives to join together in a common marketing agency is clearly reffirmed by the decisions in this case," remarked Arthur D. Little, RCMA executive director.

"Dairy farmers, through their

cooperatives, have persistently defended their actions in this matter with the firm belief that the Capper-Volstead Act makes it possible for farmer-producers to organize together, set association policy, fix prices at which their cooperative will sell their product and otherwise carry on like a business corporation without thereby violating anti-trust laws," Little added.

RCMA attorney Freyer remarked that the seven year court case was the product of several appeals.

"Anti-trust cases are com-plicated just by nature," said

According to Fairdale Farms general manager Ed Holden, his co-op is undecided on appealing

Coffin's decision.
"We are waiting to review the decision," Holden said.

At press time, attorneys representing Fairdale Farms, Inc. could not be reached for comment.
