## Ag research reference available

BELTSVILLE, Md. — A major reference work on the extensive literature resulting from agricultural and biological research of the last 25 years now is available to scientists, librarians and writers, Richard A. Farley, acting director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Library, said recently.

"The Guide to Sources for Agricultural and Biological Research," a 735-page volume, contains 5,779 citations. It was prepared under the sponsorship of the National Agricultural Library and published by the University of California Press.

"This guide should prove indispensable for those seeking information from the large and complex literature of this important field," Farley said.

Editors of the guide were J. Richard Blanchard, librarian emeritus, University of California, Davis, former USDA reference librarian, and Lois Farrell, librarian, Agricultural Library, University of California, Berkeley.

Contributors to this reference work describe and evaluate several thousand sources of information in a variety of formats.

The reference collections of numerous research libraries, including the U.S. National Agricultural Library, the Library of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food in London, the Food and Agricultural Organization Library in Rome, the libraries of the Universities of California, Minnesota, and Texas A&M were consulted for source materials. Over three years were needed to complete the

bibliographic research.

Although the guide's primary emphasis is on research in agriculture and biology, many related subjects such as ecology, forestry, meteorology and human nutrition are covered in detail. An earlier guide — Literature of Agricultural Research — was published in 1958 by Blanchard.

An unusual feature of the new edition is the material on the use of online data base files in the

chapter entitled "Computerized Data Bases for Bibliographic Research." An appendix on acronyms and abbreviations and comprehensive author, title and subject indexes keyed to item number are included.

## Plow programs set next week

HARRISBURG — The AMCO Terrace Plow Demonstration scheduled for lower Dauphin County has been rescheduled to be held on the Mylin Messick farm on Tuesday, according to Joel Myers of the Soil Conservation Service.

Last fall, a successful demonstration was held using the plow to construct cropland terraces on shale soils. This spring's demonstration will be carried out on heavier limestone soils, according to Myers.

The Mylin Messick property is located along Rt. 441, just north of Rt. 283. The demonstration will

start at 10 a.m. and will include the construction of terraces and diversions. For further information contact Mylin Messick, 944-3500 or the Harrisburg Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service at 652-7035.

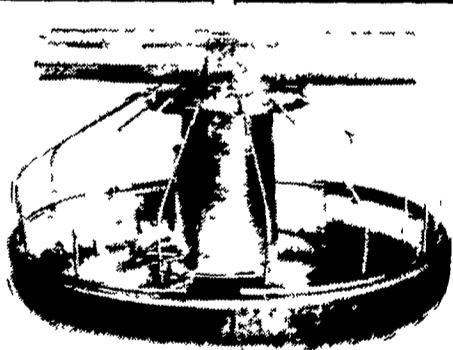
A second demonstration is scheduled for Lancaster County on Wednesday at the Elizabethtown High School. For further information call the Lancaster Soil Conservation Service Office at 299-1563 or Bill Erikson at 367-1521. Present plans call for no-till seeding of hay and/or oats as part of both demonstrations. This

practice can also be significant in reducing soil erosion.

Myers explained that this demonstration will be an excellent opportunity for everyone to see the terrace plow work under field conditions. The use of the plow should aid in the conservation effort at a time when funds for conservation work are very limited.

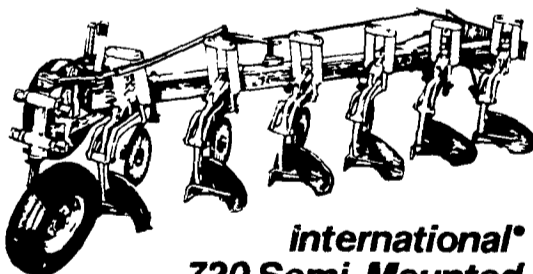

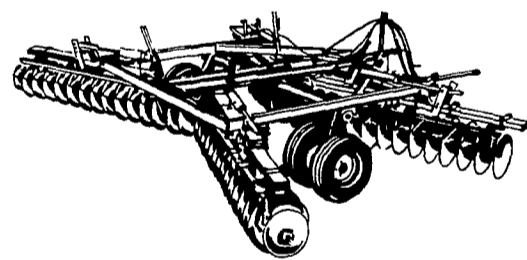
