Insurance requires damage report

HARRISBURG — The dramatic increase in participation in All-Risk or Multi-Peril Crop Insurance mandates a change in notice of damage procedure, according to Daniel Cash, Public Participation Officer of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"New regulations in effect in 1982 will give rapid, responsive, accurate service to the procedure, and increase the efficiency of the loss adjustment process," Cash added.

Current requirements for prompt written notice of damage

during the growing season will remain in effect. In addition, the producer is asked to provide written notice of probable damage at least 15 days prior to the beginning of harvest. If damage is not discovered until harvest, the grower is required to file a notice

of damage report immediately, and to reserve representative sample of the unharvested crop at least 10 feet wide and extending the full length of the field. The crop residue must be left undistrubed for 15 days from the date of the notice, or until written authority is given by the Corporation to do otherwise.

Notices of damage are to include load," Cash stated.


