are volatilized. Noted in his profession, Bollag receives invitations to lecture at numerous universities around the world.

Honored for outstanding teaching was Thomas L. Watschke, professor of turfgrass science. Noted for undergraduate teaching of turfgrass courses, he has taught 4,000 credit hours over the past 12 years. Watschke designed and wrote a vest-pocket guide to turfgrass identification. He co-advises baccalaureate students and winter course students each year. He has been co-advisor of the Penn State Turf Club. His research projects deal with weed control, growth regulation, the physical and chemical activities of plants (physiology), microclimate, and nutrition.

Achievements with the Cooperative Extension Service brought honors to Joseph A. McCurdy, professor of agricultural engineering extension. McCurdy's programs and leadership over 32 years of service were described as assisting agriculture in many areas including rural electrification, grain and hay drying, fruit and vegetable storage, emergency power supply, 4-H electric activities, animal shelter ventilation, energy conservation,

and stray voltage problems. His work with Pennsylvania potato growers was listed as enabling growers to store potatoes longer than usual with less shrinkage than previously-producing high quality.

The senior scholarship award of an engraved watch went to Russell C. Lloyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward M. Lloyd of 26 Creek Drive, Doylestown. Lloyd is graduating in forest science.

The annual junior citation of \$100 went to Frederick J. Kelley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold D. Kelley of 212 W. Third Street, Oil City. Kelley is majoring in animal production.

The sophomore award of a pen and pencil desk set went to Ray L. Smith, son of Jack R. Smith of 58 Hex Acre, Rt. 1, West Pittston. Smith

is majoring in agronomy.

Penn State faculty members initiated into Gamma Sigma Delta were Jean-Marc Bollag in agronomy; Dr. Lawrence J. Hutchinson in veterinary science extension; B. Wayne Kelly in farm management extension; Dr. L. Dwight Schwartz in veterinary science extension; Lawrence W. Specht in dairy science extension, and Francis H. Witham in horticulture.

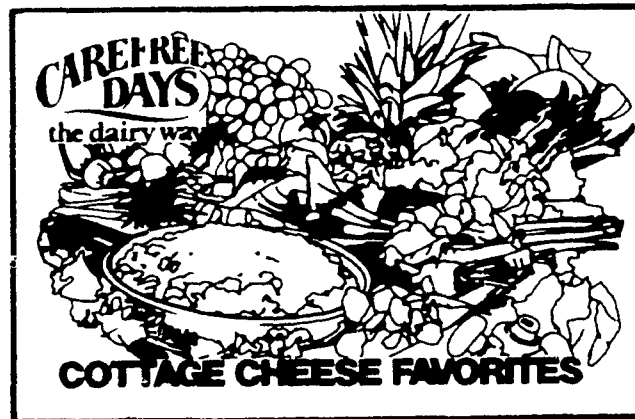

PFU praises swine ID

HARRISBURG — The executive director of the Pennsylvania Farmers Union praised the state Department of Agriculture and Secretary Penrose

Hallowell for the implementation of new swine health rules requiring identification of feeder pigs, market hogs and breeding swine.

The regulations, which took effect May 19, are designed to help control the movement of swine in the state in order to control the spread of contagious diseases to other herds.

"The need for an identification system for hogs is long overdue," said state director Carl L. Kaufman. "We are very pleased to see Secretary Hallowell implementing this program. Farmers Union hog farmers have advocated a mandatory identification system because of problems with tuberculosis and pseudorabies affecting their herds after sales. With these regulations in place, diseased swine can be traced back to the source farm."

At its annual meeting in February, delegates to the Farmers Union convention approved a mandatory identification system for swine. The family farm organization also recommended that all breeding stock offered for sale be checked for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the date of sale.

Every producer and swine finishing operation in the state will be issued a herd identification number which will be registered with the Agriculture Department, according to Secretary Hallowell.

The identification can be in the form of an ear tattoo, backslap tattoo or ear tag. Tattooing is the most reliable method of permanent identification.

The family farm organization urged all hog farmers to contact the Department of Agriculture for additional information. Telephone the Bureau of Animal Industries at 717-743-5301.
