Several early stone farmhouses will be open, including the eighteenth century Ron Rhoads home, which has an especially colorful facade; the home of Mrs Edwin Reed, which dates from the late 1700s-early 1800s; and the early nineteenth century Robert Caswell home, which was once part of a 63-acre farm.

Brick and stone houses of the mid-nineteenth century are also on the tour Among them are the James Levengood home, a "village" house, erected in the

The Alfred Vanderbeck home, a brick structure dating from the 1830s, features some very interesting twentieth century additions.

A number of the tour sites involve past or present commercial use Country taverns were once an integral part of the Boyertown area landscape, vital community structures in the 1700s and 1800s Two of these will be on the tour

One, the Yellow House Hotel, was constructed in the 1800s and still functions as a restaurant. The other, the former Pikeville Hotel, today serves as the residence of Mr and Mrs George Rodenbough Two other very interesting commercial buildings will be on view The Hereford General Store, owned by Mr. and Mrs. James Althouse, dates from the early 1800s and still retains much of its early 1900s stock Owned by the Bahr brothers, the Gabel spoke/handle factory served the wagons of bygone days Erected in 1897, the stone factory actually resembles a mill
