Commander 2913 is owned by John Henry Gile, Morgantown, N.C.

In the open show, WCR Miss Poll Paul B112 was named Junior Champion female. The January 1982 daughter of HCR Expectation Jr. II is owned by Wasdin Charolais, Tallahassee, Fla.

The Reserve Junior Female award went to Ronald Davis, Abbeville, S.C., on WCR Miss Poll Predictor N006.

The Junior Champion bull was WCR Expectation Polled B450, an April 1981 son of HCR Expectation Jr. II owned by Charles Fisher, Topeka, Kan.

The Reserve Junior Bull award went to Donald S. Bulla, Ashboro, N.C., on SPeros Mighty Mac Polled 93-1, a June 1981 son of FZ Mighty Mac Polled 828.

Sir Stone-Del King Jr. 8064 was named Reserve Senior Champion Bull. The July 1980 son of Poker King Jr. G18 is owned by Kimmont Farms, Waynesboro, Va., and Phil Rucker, N.C.

NEMA elects officers

NIAGRA FALLS, N.Y. — Directors of the Northeast Egg Marketing Association, United Egg Producer's regional cooperative serving the Mid-Atlantic and New England areas, recently heard reports that procurement of poultry meat patties for school lunch programs will soon be stepped up by the federal government.

They were also made aware of continued efforts by UEP and American Egg Board to put before egg producers and poultry meat processors the results of current research on new uses for eggs and poultry meat processors the results of current research on new uses for eggs and poultry meat that

have been conducted by American Egg Board.

Strong support was registered for investigative action that UEP has underway as to the scope and role of foreign investment in American egg production. The directors reported that Congress has mandated the use of some \$190 million over the next three years to aid American food exporters to meet competition in markets abroad. The UEP and its regionals have pledged to work to secure a fair share of this aid for egg exporters.

It was suggested UEP check whether recent entry of Canadian eggs into American markets conforms with current trade equalization rules governing trade

between the two countries.

Jack Shuford, director of UEP's insurance service reported work is underway to offer egg producers added coverages that should substantially cut their insurance costs. Steve Kula, legislative director of UEP in Washington, told the group that gross of membership in United Egg Association, the industry's political action arm, is "excellent." He called attention to a new UEP committee set up to deal with such items as cash to accrual accounting, and investment and investment tax credits. It will make report to UEP's annual meeting at Tampa Florida in October.

NEMA voted to support a change from cash to accrual accounting for the industry. Due to growth of NEMA membership in Delaware and Maryland, the directors voted to add another seat on the board.

At the session, the following were elected to serve on NEMA board: Rich Francis, Massachusetts; Don Earl, New York; Maurice Cohens, Maine; Jodie Russo, Rhode Island; Eugene Constantine, Pennsylvania and David Baker, Delaware.

Officers for 1983 all re-elected are: President John Ricca; first Vice President Bob Park; second Vice President Jeff Carlin; Treasurer Rich Francis; and Secretary, C.A. O'Reilly.

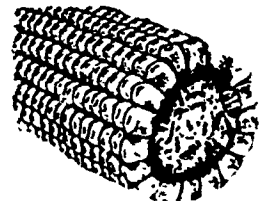

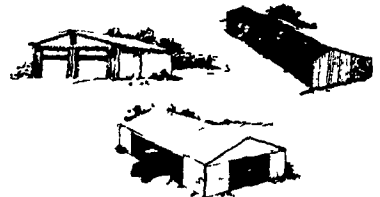
