Wayne DHIA completes record year

meeting of the Wayne County Dairy Herd Improvement Association recently was held at the Pleasant Valley Grange Hall with 150 attending.

The association completed the testing year October 1 with an average production of 14,801 pounds of milk and 546 pounds of butterfat per cow. There was an average number of 5,013 cows enrolled during the year, the largest number of cows ever enrolled during 56 years of testing.

Kevin Burleigh, Pleasant Mount, was recognized for having the highest producing herd with a production level of 20,737 pounds of milk and 768 pounds of butterfat per cow. Rowe Brothers, Honesdale were honored for having the cow with the highest lifetime production record. The cow, Sophie, reached a lifetime

HONESDALE -- The 56th annual record of 219,144 pounds of milk and 8200 pounds of butterfat. The 14 year old cow completed her eleventh lactation during the year.

The High Cow in Milk Award went to Bruce Stanton, Starrucca, for owning a cow, who completed a 305 day record of 29,114 pounds of milk and 1055 pounds of butterfat. The High Cow in Butterfat Award went to James Slocum, Susquehanna as a result of a record completed by "Carla" with 24,149 pounds of milk and 1092 pounds of butterfat.

Alton Olver, Honesdale, and Buckingham Dairies, Honesdale, were both awarded the High Quality Milk Award, which is based on the lowest average somatic cell count for the year.

Dairymen who received special recognition for having butterfat production herd averages in the 700 pound range were: Kevin Burleigh, Pleasant Mount, 768 pounds; Paul Kennedy, Honesdale, 742 pounds; Golden Willow Holstein, Honesdale, 742 pounds; James Slocum, Susquehanna, 721 pounds; Robert Fielding & Son, Lake Ariel, 721 pounds; and Bruce Stanton, Starrucca, 711 pounds.

Herds with butterfat production records over 650 pounds of butterfat were: Kinghill Farms, Starrucca, 681; James Woodmansee, Lake Como, 665; and Robert Fries, Aldenville, 663.

An election of directors was held during the course of the annual meeting with the following directors being elected: Paul Kennedy, Honesdale, Frank Marks, Damascus, Marly Shaffer, Lake Ariel and Charles Dennis, Honesdale.

Additional directors are Llewellyn Courtright, Lake Ariel, Ellis Dix, Pleasant Mount,

Theodore Kostige, Lakeville, Alton Olver, Honesdale, Gary Rickard, Honesdale and James Slocum, Susquehanna, and Grant Teeple, Equinunk.

The speaker for the evening was Raymond Pruss, Administrative Assistant, Pennsylvaniá DHIA, University Park, who is a native of Wayne County. He discussed the state DHIA program with emphasis on the state laboratory practice, protein testing, and butterfat varioation.




