

## Devereux Angus travel to Puerto Rico

**GLENMOORE** — Devereux-Soleil Farms, located in Glenmore and part of the Devereux Foundation's 17 campuses in Pennsylvania, recently exported 10 heifers and 2 bulls to Ernesto Juan, a rancher in Baymon, Puerto Rico. Juan will use the animals to build a purebred registered Angus herd in

his country. Devereux-Soleil Farms has been producing Angus cattle for forty years and is managed by Conrad L. Grove. Devereux-Soleil maintains a herd of Angus brood cows for production of purebred breeding stock, as well as beef. The Devereux Foundation,

established to Devon, Pennsylvania in 1912, serves children and adults with emotional and mental handicaps in eight states nationwide. Soleil Farms provides an agricultural program where troubled youth can learn the fundamentals of farming and work in the different areas of a farm operation under staff guidance.

## Fertilizer Institute meets next month

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — A noted U.S. Senator, a farm credit authority, a farm equipment economist, and a fertilizer industry leader will highlight the speakers' program at the 1983 Annual Meeting of The Fertilizer Institute, Feb. 13-15, in Atlanta, Ga.

Sen. Sam Nunn (D-Ga.), ranking minority member of the Senate's Small Business and Government Affairs committees, will open the speaking portion of the three-day meeting on Monday afternoon, Feb. 14. He is expected to comment on the current economic situation as it affects agriculture and suppliers of farm production inputs.

The Senate leader's remarks will be followed by reports on the status of the fertilizer industry and its national association by Institute Board Chairman Judson H. Drewry, fertilizer group president, International Minerals & Chemical Corp., and by TFI President Edwin M. Wheeler.

Tuesday, Feb. 15, features a full morning's seminar of topics

especially focused on fertilizer retailer concerns.

On Tuesday afternoon, speakers will discuss farm credit and agricultural outlook. C. T. Fredrickson, senior deputy governor, Farm Credit Administration, will present a situation report on credit for 1983 farm operations. An analysis of the year's market for farm inputs, such as equipment and fertilizers, will be presented by Dean F. McKee, a director, market economics, Deere & Co. Rolf H. Holzkaemper, president, Potash Corp. of Saskatchewan Transport, Ltd., will outline the changing patterns of potash distribution. The meeting's general sessions are open to non-members as well as Institute members.

In addition, during the Monday afternoon session, Institute members will elect 13 individuals to a three-year term on TFI's 39-member board. The newly-constituted board, subsequently, will elect its executive committee, chairman and vice chairman for the 1983-84 year.

## Private exporters report export sales to USSR

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — Private exporters have reported to the U.S. Department of Agriculture the following export sales:

— 50,000 metric tons in new sales and 150,000 tons in changes in destination from "unknown" of hard red winter wheat for delivery to the USSR during the 1982-83 marketing year, the seventh year of the long term grain supply agreement.

The marketing year for wheat ends May 31, 1983.

Sales for delivery during the seventh agreement year, which began Oct. 1, 1982, and ends Sept. 30, 1983, now total 5,174,500 tons, of which 2,175,000 is wheat, and 2,999,000 is corn.

Purchases under the sixth agreement year, which ended Sept. 30, totaled 13,869,500 tons: 6,096,900 tons of wheat and 7,772,600 tons of corn.
