

Franklin Holstein Club honors junior members, top producers

KAUFFMAN — Awards, presentations, recognition and an evening of fellowship completed another successful year for the Franklin County Holstein Club members at their Annual Meeting and Banquet.

Junior Holstein Club members went home Tuesday evening with some very prestigious awards.

The Cider and Meyers family stole the junior show as their names were called respectively for the honors. Winning the award for the first place 2-year-old in fat was J. Arlan Crider with his cow El Dor Astronaut Phoebe with a record of 723 pounds of fat and 18,136 pounds of milk. El Dor Astronaut Phoebe also was a 1982 Honorable Mention Junior All-Pennsylvania.

Rodney Meyers won the award for the highest milk record of a 2 year old. Rodney won the award with Aldina Bootmaker Janie with a record of 18,894 pounds of milk.

Beverly Meyers, sister of Rodney won the milk and fat award with 3-year-old Aldina Inspiration Blossom. Blossom won the award with a record of 20,460 pounds of fat and 756 of fat.

El Dor Gay Paula owned by J. Arlan Crider won the first place 4-year-old milk and fat title with a record of 24,535 pounds of milk and 862 of fat. And, the final junior production award was presented to Roser Crider winning the 5-year-old milk and fat award with his animal Antrim Spring Centurion Fancy. Centurion Fancy has a record of 21,912 pounds of milk and 817 pounds of fat.

Winning the junior member distinguished boy and girl of the Junior Holstein Club was Deborah Cashell winning the honor of Franklin County's Distinguished Senior Girl. And, the Franklin County Distinguished Junior Boy was Micheal Cordell.

Among other awards presented at the Annual Meeting were the trophies for the 1982 Champions of the Franklin County Holstein Show.

Winning the Grand Champion Female trophy was Crais Woodring of Ment Wood Farms winning the title with Kingstead Miss Elevation. Miss Elevation

was recently classified an Excellent 91. Reserve Grand Champion title went to Robert Eckstine of Meadow-Yu farm with Meadow-Yu Rag Apple alic also classified an Excellent 91.

Beverly Meyers won the Junior Champion female Trophy with Windy-Knoll-View Very Shanna. Beverly's Junior Champion also was a 1982 High Honorable Mention Junior All-Pennsylvania Senior Heifer Calf.

N.E. dairy co-ops agree

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — The presidents of seven northeastern dairy cooperatives last Fri. agreed on three concepts for inclusion in a new national dairy program.

The concepts are:

— Creation of an incentive program which would compensate dairy producers for a limited time for reducing production on their farms;

— Continuation of the present dairy price stabilization program, but with the addition of a "trigger mechanism" which would act to move the support price up or down depending upon the status of milk supply and demand in the country; and

— Establishment of a national dairy product promotion program.

These concepts were reported this week to the National Milk Producers Federation. The Federation, which represents most of the dairy co-ops in the country in

legislative activity in Washington, is currently working to develop a dairy plan that will get major acceptance within the dairy industry and by Congress.

The co-op presidents stressed that the concepts accepted as a basis for a dairy program are similar to those now being discussed by other groups throughout the nation.

Cooperatives participating in the meeting were: Allied Federation Cooperatives, Canton, New York; Dairylea Cooperative, Syracuse, New York; Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative, Syracuse, New York; Lehigh Valley Farmers, Allentown, Pennsylvania; Niagara Milk Cooperative, Niagara Falls, New York; Northeast Dairy Cooperative Federation, Syracuse, New York; and Upstate Milk Cooperatives Inc., Leroy, New York.
