The high herd in the Centre County DHIA for February was Valley Wide Farm, Spring Mills, R2. The herd of 77 cows had a rolling herd average of 21,040 pounds of milk and 830 pounds of butterfat with 87.5 per cent days in milk.

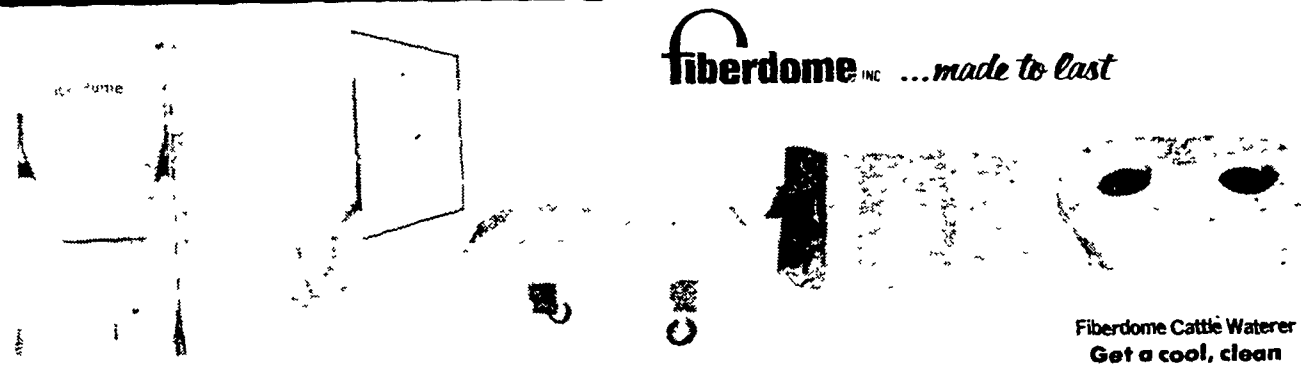
