

## Nominations being accepted for Pa. Bull Test

HARRISBURG — Nominations for Pennsylvania's 1983-84 Bull Test are being accepted between June 15 and August 15.

The performance test is conducted by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture at the Meat Animal Evaluation Center, 651 Fox Hollow Road, State College, in cooperation with Penn State and the Pennsylvania Cattlemen's Association.

Bulls in the test must be born between January 1, 1983 and April 15, 1983 to be eligible. They also must have a type score of 12 or

higher, an adjusted 205-day weight of 475 pounds for British breeds and 525 pounds for Continental breeds, and a 205-day weight ratio of 100 or more. If the ratio is not available, the respective 205-day weight requirement is 50 pounds heavier.

Pennsylvania breeders are given first choice for participation in the testing program. If space remains, out-of-state nominations will be accepted until pens are full.

The testing program is designed to provide information to aid genetic improvement in the

Pennsylvania beef industry. Both large and small producers may participate and have their bulls compared under similar conditions.

The deadline for nominations is

## Good drainage important on farms

UNIVERSITY PARK — It has been a wet spring and much farmland is still holding water on the surface, indicating that you may have a drainage problem. If you are trying to decide what you can

Controlled removal of excess water helps increase production and provides additional fertile

cropland on most existing farms, says Extension agricultural engineers at Penn State.

A knowledge of surface and subsurface drainage methods is important to those thinking about installing systems to dry up a rust spot.

Penn State has provided for you, in the form of a correspondence course, information on how to run a level; construct drainage structures; and, how to design, install, and maintain various surface and subsurface drainage systems.

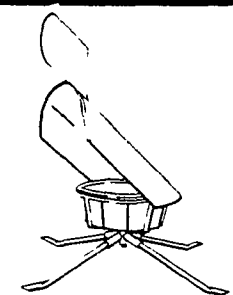

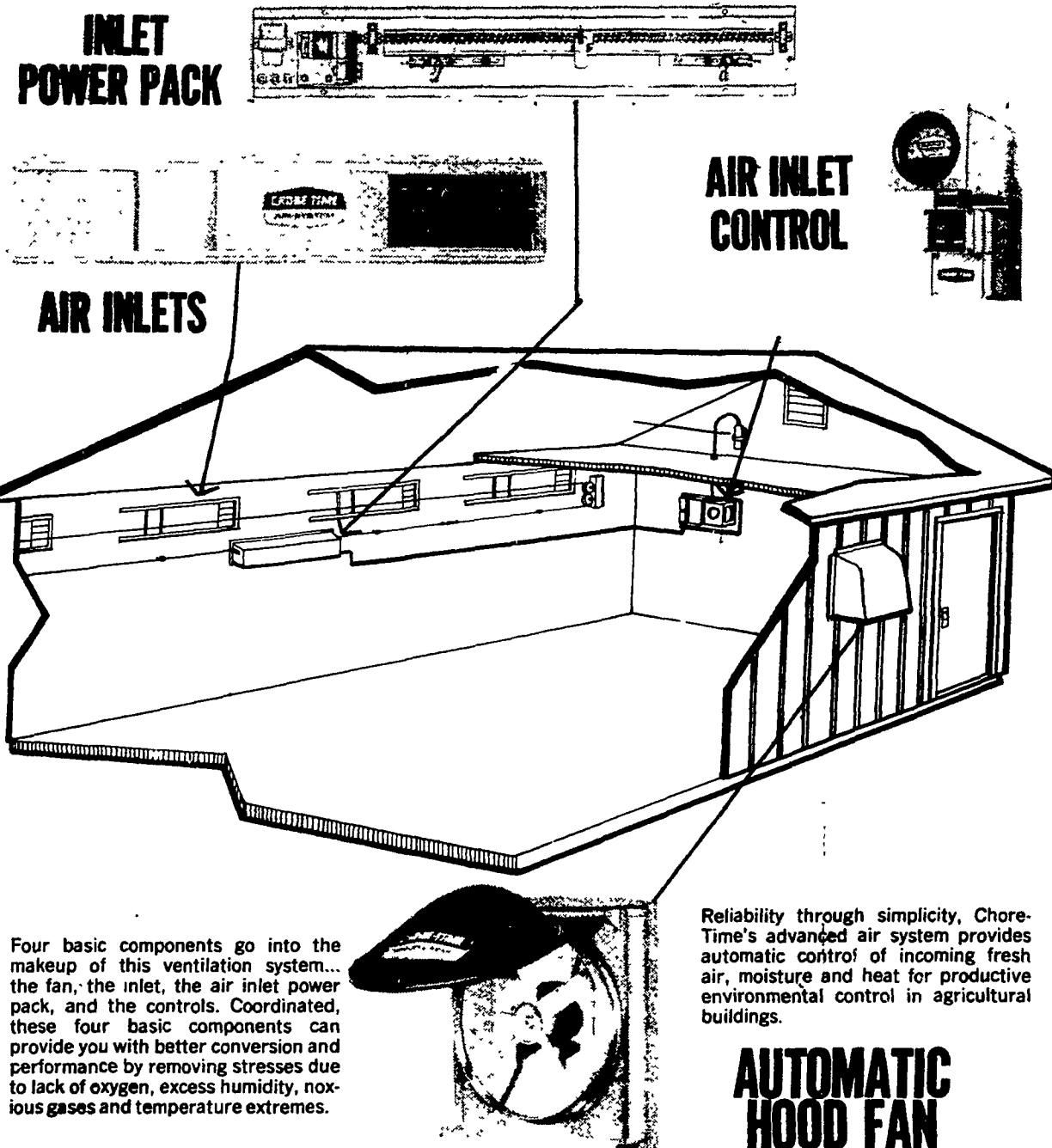
