Brubaker wins teacher award

DOYLESTOWN — Gary L. Brubaker, Associate Professor of Animal Science at Delaware Valley College, was presented the Oustanding Teacher of the Year award recently. The annual award is presented by White Eagle Laboratories, Inc. of Doylestown, to a teacher of animal technicians in the Eastern Pennsylvania and New York areas.

The award, an inscribed plaque and a \$1000.00 honorarium, was presented to Brubaker for "his outstanding teaching ability and concern for his students." He is a 1967 graduate of DelVai in Animal Husbandry, and earned his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

Brubaker has been teaching at DelVal since 1970. He was instrumental in establishing a four-course-sequence in Small Animal Laboratory Management in 1974. 1400 students have successfully graduated from the program since its inception. He has also been influential in placing many of his students in professional careers relating to small animal management within the Pharmaceutical related industries.

Brubaker is advisor to the very active Laboratory Animal Club, supervisor of the small animal lab, and is a member of the scheduling, library, admissions and research committees. He has also served as chairman of the faculty council for two consecutive years, and as advisor for six senior research projects.

He takes an active part in the sheep and swine program at the livestock farm, and uses these facilities in teaching the sheep and swine production course.

Over the past few years he has

assisted the Bucks Extension office in conducting sheep shearing and livestock production schools, as well as the Bucks County wool pool.

Dr. Brubaker is President-elect of the Delaware Valley branch of the American Association of Laboratory Animal Science. His professional memberships include the American Society of Animal Science, Delta Tau Alpha and Phi Sigma honor societies, National Block and Bridle and Outstanding Young Men of America.

His community activities include serving as a member of the Education Committee and as a Sunday School teacher at the Doylestown Methodist Church. He is a past director of the Pinehickon Softball League, has coached softball and gives numerous livestock demonstrations at local high schools and county parks. He and his wife Donna and daughters Jill, 14 and Jackie, 12, reside in Gardenville, Pa.-H.S.


The week-long program featured included sessions on social and human relations, group leadership and personal communication, motivation and pride to help mold the FFA'ers into better leaders in the chapters and communities.
