Crops Day to stress soil fertility

ROCK SPRINGS — Several important areas of soil fertility management will be the focus of attention during the annual Crops Day Sept. 27 at the Agricultural Research Center of Penn State, nine miles southwest of State College on Route 45 West.

Included will be (1) ways to reduce losses from fertilizer nitrogen, (2) side dressings of nitrogen, (3) use of home grown legume nitrogen, (4) manure

management, and (5) use of starter fertilizer.

"Soil fertility is one of the most important factors that farmers can control in growing a crop," declared Douglas Beegle, extension agronomist arranging the soil fertility demonstrations for Crops Day.

"To make sound and intelligent management decisions, farmers need and understanding of soil fertility and guidance for applying this infomation efficiently on their farms," he added.

And he indicated side dressing of nitrogen, as opposed to applying all of the nitrogen at planting time, has been shown to increase corn yields significantly. Research results and application techniques, including a display of side dressing equipment, will be highlighted September 27.

Beegle said manure management for optimum nutrient

utilization by crops is another important topic that will be covered during the Penn State Crops Day. Corn yield data from "surface" versus "injected" liquid dairy manure applications will be presented to illustrate the importance of working manure into soil to conserve nutrients.

"We will also be looking at fertilization of no-till corn, emphasizing the importance of starter fertilizer," he commented. "Research has shown that starter

fertilizer increases corn yields. Current work at the Agronomy Research Farm, a part of the field day tour, will show the effect of different methods of applying starter fertilizer to no-till corn."

The Sept. 27 Crops Day will emphasize corn and soybean research and management practices. Tours will start at 9:30 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. Lunch will be available at the Agronomy Research Farm.
