There were 41 exhibitors in the show and sale. There were 123 pigs shown and 134 sold. The overall weight was 29,345 pounds, with 219 pounds being the average weight.

pigs," Parsons said. He explained he was looking for 'pigs that are lean, free from fat, with evidence of muscling in

them." Other top winners were Tim Pfautz, Stevens, with the Champion Pair, weighing in at 195 pounds each, and Liz Chapman, Manheim R5, with the Reserve Champion Pair, weighing 225 and 220 pounds.

Prices were down from last year. The Grand Champion brought \$2.40 per pound, down 77 cents from last year.


