that will better tolerate stress conditions and increase performance, according to Mitchell.

Ishler develops new hybrid varieties by crossing inbred varieties. From the time he begins research on a new variety until it becomes commercially available takes nearly 10 years. According to Ishler only about one percent of the varieties developed and tested

make it through the entire testing procedure and are made commercially available. Since Ishler started his breeding work at Middletown 19 years ago, he has developed four varieties of Pioneer seed corn that are now commercial varieties, they are Pioneer 3707, 3744, 3572, and 3382. He is presently working on a variety that is now in the precommercial state, Pioneer X0403.
