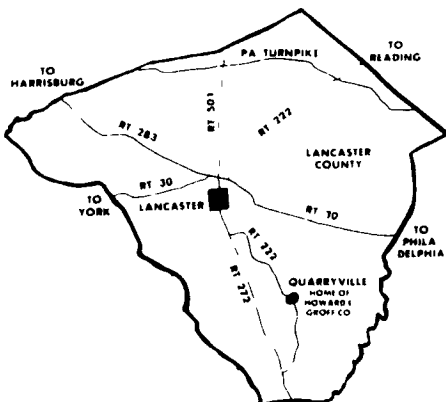

Dairylea calls for Conable amendment defeat

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — The president of one of the Northeast's major dairy cooperatives has urged members of the House of Representatives to reject a move by the Reagan Administration that "will destroy any possibility of new dairy legislation this year and probably next year as well."

Clyde E. Rutherford, President of the 3,000-member Dairylea Cooperative of Syracuse, in a telegram to New York and Pennsylvania House members called on them to defeat the Conable Amendment and support the Dairy Compromise bill. Introduced by Congressman Barber Conable (R-N.Y.), the Conable Amendment would replace the current \$1.00 a hundredweight milk tax on farmers with authority for the Secretary of Agriculture to cut the dairy price support by as much as \$1.50 a hundred pounds of milk.

"For many months," said Rutherford, "more than 85 percent of the nation's dairy farmers have supported the Dairy Compromise bill which would provide some measure of cash flow assistance to dairy farmers who reduce production. Dairy experts across the country have said that this bill would provide a quicker reduction in milk production than anything else now being offered, including the Conable price support cut."

"Originally, the Administration had agreed that if the Dairy Compromise bill passed both houses, President Reagan would approve it. Now, the administration has stepped into the congressional debate and tipped the scales in favor of a measure that will unquestionably put thousands of dairy farmers out of business across the country."

Rutherford said that if the House passes the Conable Amendment, there is great doubt that a House-Senate Conference committee, faced with the prospect of compromising two greatly different bills can come up with a legislative solution.

"The net result," he said "will be a continuation of the \$1.00 milk tax for many months, perhaps until a

new farm bill is written and becomes law on Oct. 1, 1985. By that time, irreparable damage will have been done to the nation's economy. The dairy industry is one of the major sources of jobs and commerce in this country. When we destroy its viability, we destroy a part of our economy...and it could be enough to seriously undermine the ongoing economic recovery."
