1979. Brubaker said he felt because of his age and for health consideration, that it was time for someone younger to assume the position.


Brubaker was presented a plaque in appreciation for his outstanding and dedicated service to the club.

In 1932 he went back into the business.

"At that time there was alot of stress put on a creamline, because we were selling raw milk." reflected Brubaker. "That is why we converted our herd to Avrshires.'

"We bulit the herd up to about 55 to 60 head. The people in the borough of Lititz were very pleased with our Ayrshire milk." Brubaker remembers with great pride.

The Brubakers now rent their farm to Stanley Miller. The Miller's herd is comprised of Guernseys and Avrshires.
