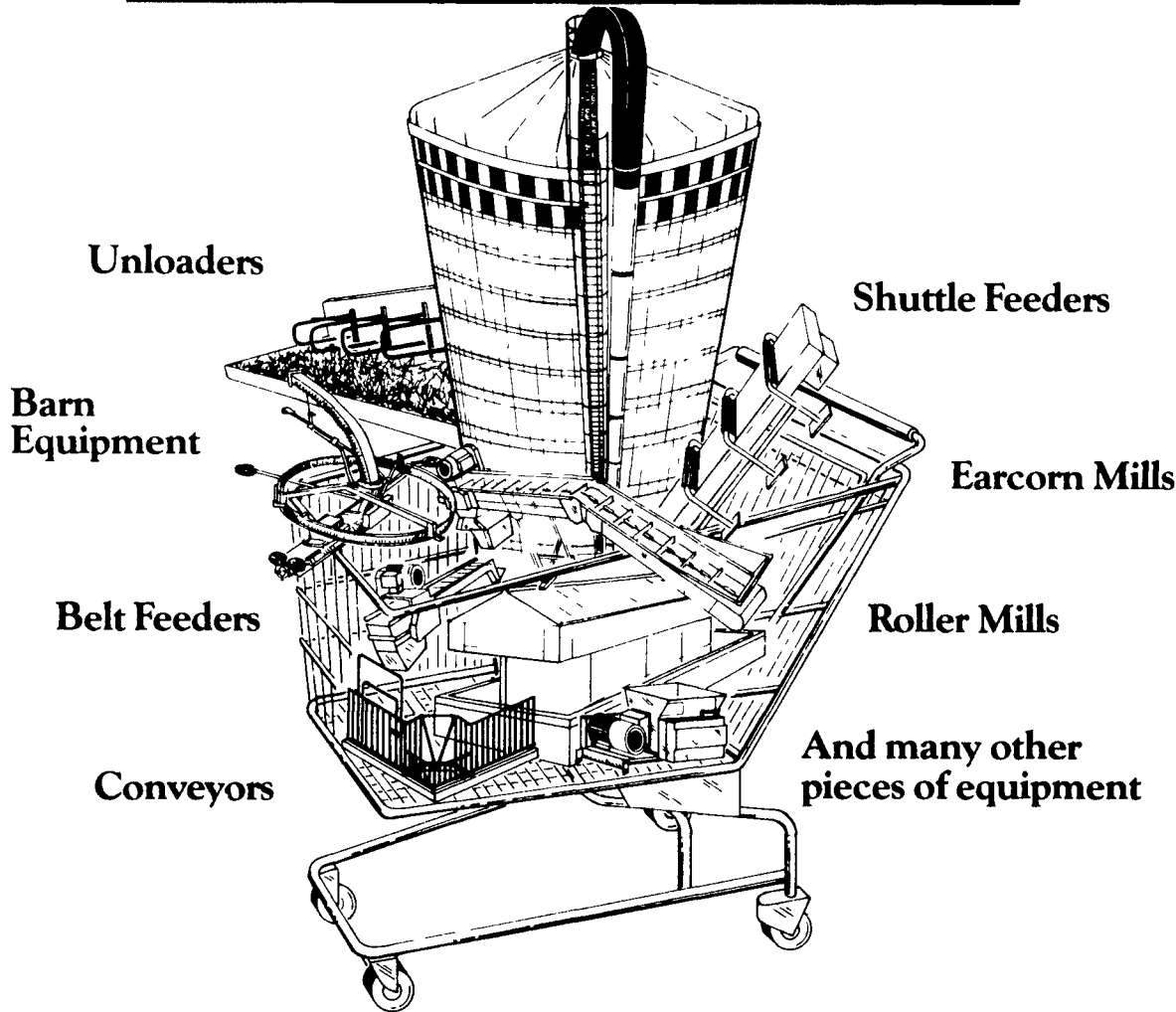

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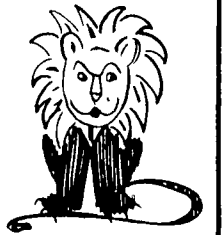

LEBANON — Nominations are being accepted for the national "Conservation Teacher-of-the-Year" awards program, according to Donald Bollinger, Chairman of the Lebanon Conservation District. The competition is open to all full-time teachers working at the kindergarten through high school level who have developed an outstanding program of environmental education.

The National Conservation Teacher-of-the-Year will receive \$1,000 in cash and an expense paid trip to Honolulu, Hawaii, for the 1985 annual convention of the National Association of Conservation Districts. The national second place winner receives a \$500 cash award and the first place regional winner will receive \$200.

Co-sponsored by NACD and the Allis Chalmers Corporation, the purpose of the awards program is to encourage the development of creative learning experiences in conservation for young people. "Any teacher in a public or private school in our conservation district who puts emphasis on environmental conservation as a regular part of the instructional program is eligible for nomination," said Mr. Bollinger.

The awards program also honors the conservation districts judged to have provided the most effective stimulus and help for conservation education programs within the district.



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
