ALTOONA — The final touches are being put on the exciting plans for the Pennsylvania Holstein Convention, February 21, 22 and 23 at the Sheraton Inn, Altoona, Pa.

The Central District Holstein Breeders are pleased to invite their many friends to Altoona, the home of Miss Pennsylvania and the world famous Horseshoe Curve, which opened to traffic on February 15, 1854. People have always been thrilled by the sight of trains circling this great amphitheatre high in the Allegheny Mountains and convention participants will have the same opportunity in February. With the coming of the railroad to Altoona, the area grew into a city and Conrail is still the major employer.

The Sheraton, located a couple of miles south of Altoona on route 220 is convention headquarters. All 200 rooms at the Sheraton have been reserved plus a block of rooms at the Holiday Inn (formerly Quality Inn). The Sheraton has a glass-domed heated swimming pool, a relaxed sauna and a game parlor with billiards and many other games. The delightful Tropical Courtyard and Luxurious Laural Room provide superb dining while quality entertainment is provided at the Grouses's Nest. Nearby one will find excellent shopping opportunities at the Malls and Outlet Stores. And, if it is sporting activities that you like, how about

Host Day

Wednesday, February 22

Convention goers have a variety of activities planned for them on Host Day... All ski lovers will welcome the 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. excursion to Blue Knob Ski Resort, boasting the highest skiable peak in the tri-state area just a half hour bus ride from the Sheraton. The other planned recreational activity is a Bowling Tournament from 8 a.m. to noon. Twenty alleys have been reserved so be prepared for a lot of fun. And for all the others, there is a very interesting tour planned to Baker's Mansion and the Railroad Memorial Museum from 9 A.M. to 12 noon and a repeat from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Elias Baker was an ironmaster and his mansion stands as a monument to the craft and skill of the early settlers. The Railroad Museum offers displays of railroad memorabilia and ar-

tifacts plus scale models and operating model railroads.

The highlight of Host Day for some will start at 1 p.m. when conventioners leave for the train station and ride on the "Pennsylvanian" west from Altoona to Johnstown, by way of the world famous Horseshoe Curve, a national historic site. The curve was built entirely by men with picks, shovels, horses and drags. It is a scenic wonder.

Buffet and Sale

The sale cattle will be housed in the Frankstown Armory, located between the Sheraton and Holiday Inn. The sale buffet will be served from 4:30 to 6:15 followed by a sale of outstanding cattle at 7:00 P.M. in the Ballroom.

Thursday, February 23

Convention Day begins with the Awards Breakfast at 7:00 a.m. with a buffet for the hearty appetites and a continental breakfast for the others. An additional highlight during the program will be the State Junior Dairy Bowl Finals. An educational Men's Seminar starts at 9:30 in the Ballroom.

The Ladies Program and luncheon starts at 10:00 a.m. at the Penn Alto Hotel in downtown Altoona. Dr. Dan Lago, head of the Gerontology Center at Penn State will speak on the topic of aging. Following the luncheon, a style show of womens fashions dating

from the 1750's to the 1890's will be provided by the "Bosom Buddies to Bustle", a group from the Blair County Historical Society. The last speaker will be Dr. Thomas Behm who will speak on farm related emergencies such as silo gas poisoning, and falls from heights.
