

School tours are another way the Hesses promote good customer relations and show school children and their parents how milk is really made.

Undertaking all the milk production and marketing functions, from cow to consumer, has made Larry and John real advocates of milk promotion and advertising. Larry campaigned aggressively to get the milk promotion referendum passed in Pennsylvania two years ago, only to have it defeated. He sees the 15 cents deduction for promotion_and the opportunity for a national referendum in September of next year as the brightest spot of the new dairy legislation and hopes other dairymen will support it.
