N.W. Maple Producers stress quality

MEADVILLE – One hundred and twenty maple producers from Northwest Pennsylvania, New York and Ohio attended the 23rd annual meeting of the Northwestern Pennsylvania Maple Producers Association on Jan. 27.

This year's program centered around producing a quality maple product. Robert Morgan, of Erie Testing Laboratories, discussed the laboratory procedures for analyzing maple products and how to determine if the maple syrup had been adulterated. The audience was amazed at what can be determined through a laboratory test Paul Richard, of Chardon, Oh., also discussed maple syrup quality and graded 23 samples of maple syrup the way it is done at the Farm Show in Harrisburg. The syrup samples were scored on density, clarity, flavor and color Then each sample was discussed as to why it was scored the way it was. The syrup samples were brought in by the various producers

Penn State Extension Forester James Finley talked about his trip to New York and New England to study maple production He showed slides on the work that is being done at Cornell by Lew Statts on maple production techniques

The Northwestern Maple Queen and the State Maple Princess Deanna Stahlman, of Reno, told what she has been doing as the representative of the maple industry. Frank Schambach, of West Falls, N.Y, and Troy Firth, of Spartansburg, demonstrated reverse osmosis systems to remove up to 60% of the water from the maple sap prior to boiling This is indeed an energy and time saving procedure in the process of making maple syrup Charles Dengler, N.W.
