

Welcome a baby with a sampler

Why not welcome a new baby with a birth record sampler? A sampler with toys, teddy bears, baby's name, weight and birthdate 18 a beautiful addition to any newborn's room.

Birth records can be very special gifts, no matter how you make them. As long as the message is loving, the stitchery technique and exact design are up to you.

Both birth records shown are cross-stitch samplers. One uses the counted cross-stitch technique; the other, stamped cross-stitch. In both cases, the message reads: The best place to be is in a loving

family."

The alphabet sampler is stamped cross-stitch. In other words, the design is already preprinted on fabric. To make the sampler, a crafter sews crossstitches and backstitches over the design.

The "Welcome Baby" sampler, on the other hand, is counted crossstitch. To make this sampler, a crafter copies the entire design, complete with teddy, duck, bunny and striped border, onto blank cross-stitch fabric from a separate printed chart.

Both stamped and counted cross-













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

To learn more about making a birth record right now, however, just read on.

A counted cross-stitch design is easier to make than it may sound. Having the right supplies, including graph paper and special cross-stitch cloth, is more important than having great artistic

If you're adventuresome, you can draw any design according to the directions below. To test the technique, however, here are directions for making counted cross-stitch messages and hearts:
MATERIALS: "Aida," "har-

danger" or other even-weave fabric; blunt needle; embroidery floss; graph paper; pencil. Optional: embroidery hoop.

MESSAGE: 1. Write a short message on graph paper. 2. Keep all letters simple sticking to the graph paper lines as much as possible. 3. Leave at least one box between letters. 4. Leave at least two boxes between words.

HEARTS: 1. Draw small hearts around message. 2. As a suggestion, draw hearts nine boxes wide and seven boxes high. 3. Count boxes to make sure both sides of heart are symmetrical. 4. Fill in heart shapes with crosses.

CENTERING: 1. Find and mark center of chart, 2. Find center of fabric. Mark with basting stitches.

STITCHING: 1. Thread needle with two strands of floss, 2.

Counting one square of fabric for each square on your graph, find top of design. 3. Working from top to bottom through design, work one cross-stitch on fabric for each cross-stitch indicated in your graph. 4. Work cross-stitches as illustrated (a) 5. Work letters with the backstitch, one square at a time (b).

HINTS: 1. Use the same holes for adjacent stitches so that all stitches touch. 2. When moving from one design area to another, end off and begin again. 3. Hide loose ends by running ends through stitches on back of fabric.


Townships).
