

Century Farms applications available

HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania farms, which have been owned by the same family for 100 consecutive years, are eligilbe for recognition as Century Farms.

The Century Farms Program emphasizes the "pride in the contributions of these farms as a symbol to remind us of where we want to go in the future." Governor Thornburgh has set the preservation of family farms as a priority of his administration.

To be eligible for the award, the farm must be owned by the same family for 100 consecutive years to

Northeast regional organization.
