Hort tour is scheduled

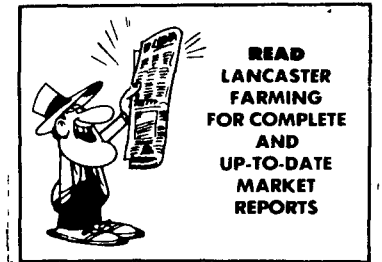

The Adams County Poultry Association will provide a chicken barbeque lunch at the South Mountain Fairgrounds. Tuesday's itinerary includes a tour of the Penn State Fruit Research Lab and test plots in Biglerville, and a machinery

demonstration.

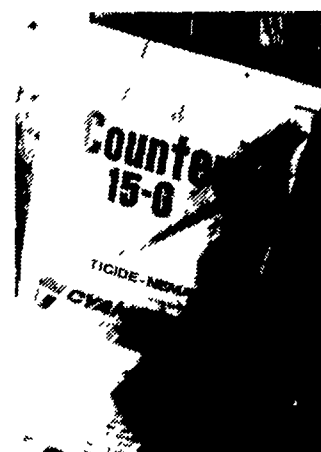

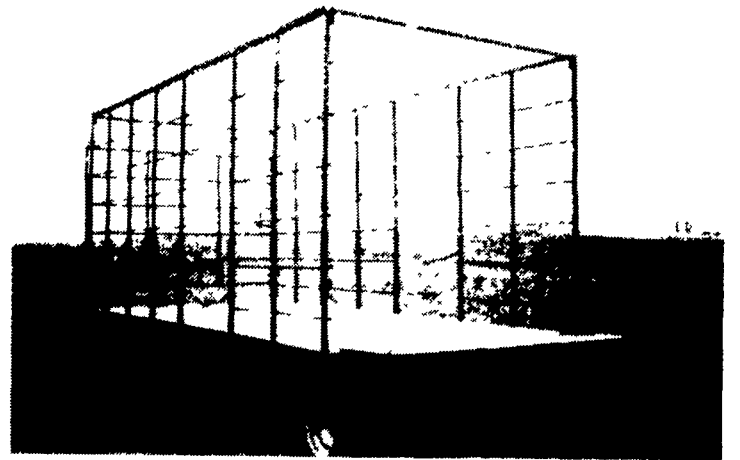

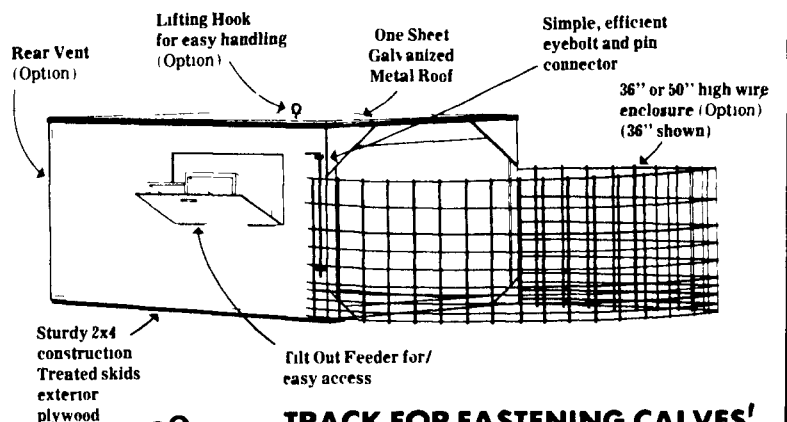
