

Jim and Jesse to perform benefit concert May 5

INTERCOURSE — About a year ago, a group of men were gathered around the coffee pot at Leroy B. Esh's Hardware Store in Intercourse, Pa. The small talk

ranged over the usual topics: the price of tobacco, the crush of tourists, so-and-so's cow had twin calves, the weather. The coffee drinking session at the store is one of the rituals which bind the

residents of Intercourse and Environs into a mutually supportive citizens group.

Leroy Esh is a totally blind man who, against all odds, is the successful operator of a hardware store. Leroy is quick to point out that his desire to be self-supportive was nurtured and developed by his training at the greater Pittsburgh guild for the blind. The guild is a rehabilitation and training center for blind adults.

Leroy is proud of his training. He told the coffee crowd that the school was in dire need of funds to continue its work. The coffee drinkers rallied around Leroy and decided to try to raise money to support local students at the school. They formed "the outlook association for the blind." Local farm folk donated animals for pig roasts and the members of the "Outlook Association" rolled up their sleeves and sold pork sandwiches, root beer, and other goods. All of the proceeds were placed in the "Outlook Association" account to help the blind. Neighbors from Intercourse and surrounding communities rallied to support the efforts of the hard working members.

The idea of helping blind students has really caught fire in the community. The biggest event undertaken by the "Association" will be held on Saturday, May 5th, from 2:00 P.M. to 11:00 P.M. There will be an all-day pig roast and



The "Jim and Jesse Grand Ole Opry Show" will be at Martin Auctioneers Sales Barn next Saturday to give a benefit concert for the blind.

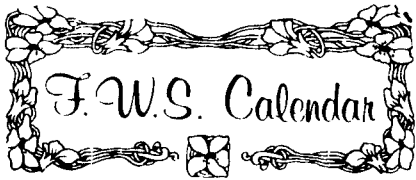
food sale followed by the "Jim and Jesse Grand Ole Opry Show" at 8:00 P.M.

Jim and Jesse are playing this benefit performance after completing a five-nation European tour. They will drive all night and most of the day Saturday after doing a concert in Alabama to play the benefit show in Intercourse. The Ole Sheriff, Bobby Montgomery; the Stone Mountain Boys; The Wings of Bluegrass; and Al Carpenter, of WGAL-TV, will also perform.

two miles east of Intercourse have been donated for the occasion. There will be food and free music on the grounds in the afternoon followed by a show in the sales barn starting at 8:00 P.M. The price of admission for the show, \$5 for adults.

All profits from this food sale and show will go directly to support the blind through the "Outlook Association." Costs are being kept at Rock Bottom and in the finest tradition of hard-working, frugal, Pennsylvania people, the money will be used for direct aid to deserving local blind people.

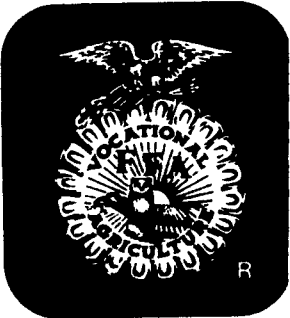

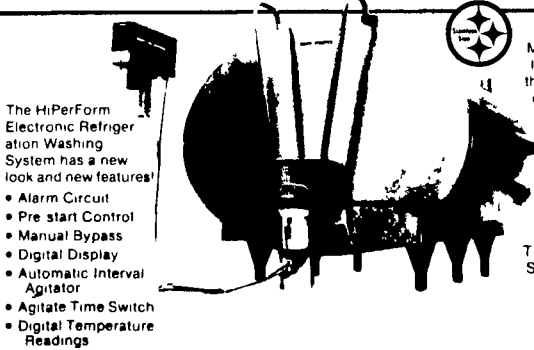
