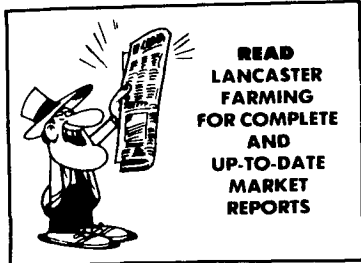

appearances for her in June.

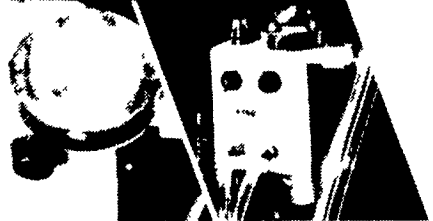

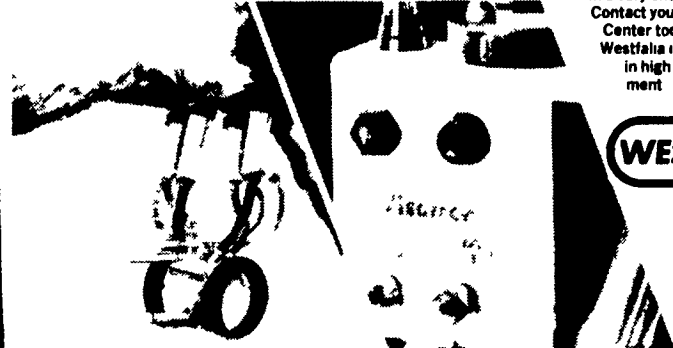

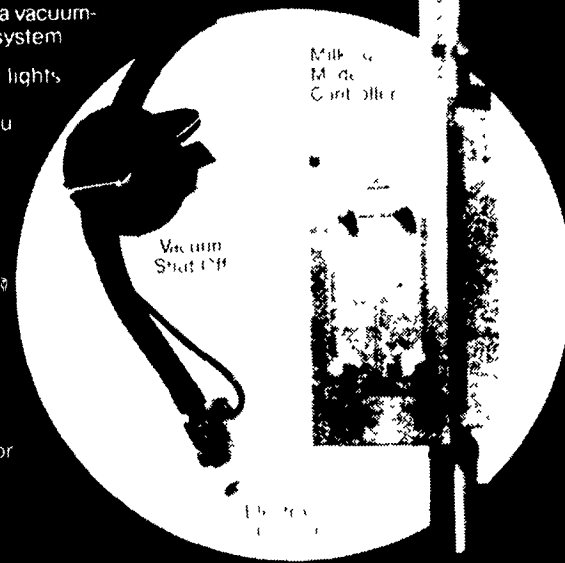
