## Research helpful when selecting appliances

NEWARK, Del. — When you're shopping for an appliance, deciding which brand to buy can be difficult. The salesperson recommends one brand, your neighbor has heard a different brand is best, and your mother has relied on still another brand for years. Whose advice should you heed?

Your best bet may be to take the advice of a relative or friend whose opinion you value and who is familiar with a particular brand, says Delaware extension home economist Pat Wilson. If you don't know anyone who has used the type of appliance you plan to buy, you have several alternatives: believe the salesperson, rely on advertising, or research the product yourself.

When researching a product, first check the features that vary

from one brand to another. Decide which would be most useful to you. If several brands offer the same features, your next step is to check the warranty.


A warranty is the manufacturer's agreement to repair or replace a product if problems occur during a specified period. It must state exactly what types of repairs will be covered and for how long. Not all warranties are the same, Wilson says. Look for a full warranty on all parts and labor, your guarantee that the appliance will be repaired or replaced free during the warranty period. The duration of the warranty should give you enough time to use the appliance and discover any manufacturing defects while the agreement is still in force.

Check also for the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label, which means an appliance has met UL electrical standards. Although a manufacturer is not required to obtain UL approval, the UL label assures customers that the appliance is electrically safe if used as directed.

Look for products from manufacturers which have local service centers, consumer hotlines and other local consumer services.

Before making your final decision, refer to consumer publications such as Consumer Reports, Consumers' Research, Consumer Reports annual buying guide issue, and Best Buys by Consumer Guide. These publications contain impartial product recommendations of comsumer testing organizations. You can find them in your public library.



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
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
