## Peach trees laden with 19 million pound crop

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Now is the time for all fresh peach lovers to come forth and enjoy the "Queen of Fruits" from Maryland orchards. Growers say their trees are now laden with peaches.

According to George Roche of the Maryland Department of Agriculture, "we are looking at a 19 million pound peach crop for 1984 in the state. Since last winter's freeze damage to some trees, the weather has been ideal for peaches with exceptional size of Maryland

peaches being very common."

"The problem with peaches is that they have such a short season. So, if you are planning to can, freeze, jam or jelly, or just sit down for a few days and gorge on

super peaches, you should visit your local roadside market or pickyour-own orchard as soon as possible. Depending on the variety of peaches, you should find a good supply for the next three weeks," he concluded.
