point for consideration and we hope that others in the swine industry will examine it and make suggestions."

Rep. Scheetz also pointed out that the concept could be adapted to other areas of agriculture, such as dairy or poultry, and separate funds could be maintained for those producers.

Basic parts of the concept, which has been put forth as an alternative to the previously proposed feed tax and has been outlined to PFA, Grange, PennAg Industries and other groups, include:

—A Pork Producers Promotion and Indemnification Board would

be created within the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to administer the program and fund.

—The Board would consist of 10 members, including the Secretary of Agriculture or a designee, a swine vet from the Bureau of Animal Industry (nonvoting), Penn State swine specialist (nonvoting), PFA representative who is active pork producer, Grange representative who is active pork producer, PFU representative who is active pork producer, two representatives of the Pa. Pork Producers Council, a pork packer representative and a pork marketer.

—Thus, the overall operation of the Board and administering of the fund would be under the control of

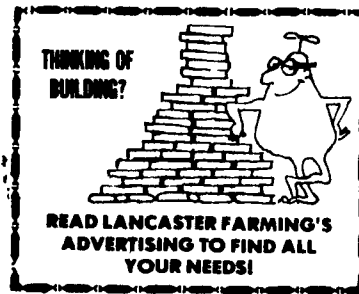
active pork producers, who are the dominant members of the board.

—Among the responsibilities of the Board would be the determination and payment of the amounts of indemnification to be paid a pork producer based on the loss of production for such reasons as depopulation to control disease.

—Other duties of the Board would be supporting research to control disease and contract with the Pennsylvania Pork Producers Council at a rate not less than that fixed for the State by the National Producers Council to handle promotion activities of the Board.

—Funds would be raised through a checkoff fee imposed on the gross sale price of all swine at the first point of sale, including all market hogs, feeder pigs and breeding animals, which pass through receiving stations, auctions and packers.

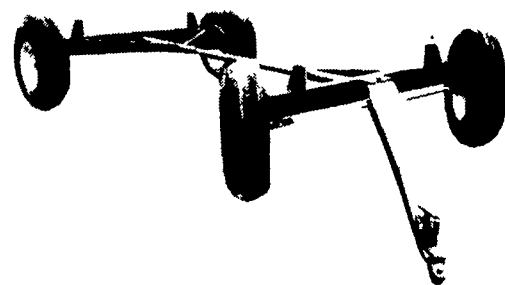
—This checkoff, which has been suggested at one-half percent of each animal's sale price for discussionary purposes, would include the already established Pork Producers Council fee.

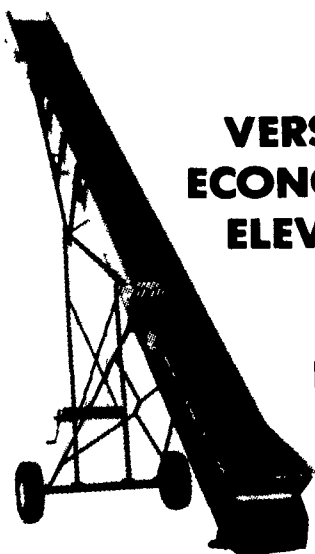

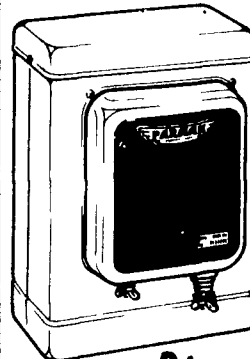
