#### Va. meat packer agrees to \$1,000 penalty

Harrisonburg Wholesale Meat Co., Inc., a meat packer at Harrisonburg, Va., has agreed to a \$1,000 civil penalty and a cease and desist order from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

A USDA official said the firm agreed to the order to settle charges it failed to pay promptly for livestock bought at public markets in the Shenandoah Vallev

WASHINGTON, D.C. - of Virginia, and in southern filed by USDA in July under Pennsylvania.

B.H. (Bill) Jones, head of USDA's Packers and Stockyards Administration, said the firm's payments ranged from 4 to 11 days late from January through May of this year.

In agreeing to the order, Harrison Wholesale Meat neither admitted nor denied the administrative charges which were

The cease and desist order, similar to a permanent injunction. was issued to insure future compliance with the P&S Act.

The P&S Act is an antitrust, fair trade practice and payment protection law. It is designed to maintain integrity in the marketing of livestock, poultry and meat, and in the marketplace.
