Karlie's dam is Bransdale Tempo Kris - ET. Scored 87 as a two-year-old, Kris is predicted to produce 26,881 pounds milk and 888 pounds fat on her second record.

The fourth high-selling animal, Harpster Chairman Boopat - Twin, was consigned by R. Wayne Harpster and purchased by Jim and Kim Grove for \$1,700. The Cal-Clark Board Chairman daughter is due to Williards Valiant Charger.

Dan Snare bought the fifth highselling animal for \$1525. Tom Kelly consigned Spring-Lane Bell Blenda, a junior two-year-old Bell daughter bred to Sunny-Craft Chief Spirit.
