Cornell prof wins award

URBANA, IL - Robert H. Foote, an animal scientist from Cornell University, received the 1985 "Upjohn Physiology Award" from the American Dairy Science Association, which held its annual meeting at the University of Illinois.

Foote was recognized for his research accomplishments in animal physiology, particularly those published during the past five years. He is known internationally for his research in animal reproduction, sperm Sponsored by the Pennmarva physiology, artificial insemination, in vitro fertilization, and ovum and embryo transfer techniques for various animal species including dairy cows.

The Jacob Gould Schurman Professor of Animal Physiology, Foote is a faculty member in the New York State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell. He recently was named the "Distinguished Andrologist for 1985" by the American Society of Andrology for his research contributions in animal physiology.

Previously, Foote has won several other research and teaching awards, including the American Society of Animal Science's Animal Physiology and Endocrinology Award; the national Association of Animal Breeders' Award for Research; the Spallanzani Award from the Italian Government; the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching; and the Professor of Merit Award and the Edgerton Career Teaching Award, both from Cornell.
