

Stephanie Carpenter earns Potter FFA beef honors

MILLPORT — Fifteen beef animals and 43 dairy cattle were shown in the 1985 4-H and FFA junior beef and dairy show, last week, at the Potter County fair at Millport.

Stephanie Carpenter, Shinglehouse, showed the Grand Champion female beef, Patches, a 7/8 Simmental. Stephanie's animal also won a blue first place ribbon in the Simmental class. Reserve grand champion, a senior yearling Angus, Trudy, was shown by

Louise Crossley, Coudersport. Louise also took a first place in the senior yearling Angus class. Both girls reared their animals as 4-H projects.

Other first place female beef winners were Judy Erway, Genesee, an FFA member who took the summer yearling heifer class for Black Angus with Christi; Gina Spees, Shinglehouse, showed the first place and champion female Charolais-Holstein, Cinnamon.

In Hereford classes, Janet Matthews, Shinglehouse, took first place junior heifer calf with Biscuit; Kevin Kosa, Ulysses, took a first place in summer yearling heifer class with Daisy.

Alan Cornell, Ulysses, took a first place blue ribbon with Lacie, a junior yearling heifer, and Janet Matthews took a blue ribbon with Buford, a four year old cow.

Grand champion market steer was a heavyweight animal, a cross between Simmental and Angus,

shown by Stephanie Carpenter. The animal also earned Stephanie a first place blue ribbon in the heavyweight class.

Joel Kosa earned a first place in the medium weight class with Bubba Beefer, a Hereford. First place lightweight went to Nedra Matthews, Shinglehouse. The reserve grand champion steer was shown by Janet Matthews and was a Polled Hereford named Parmalee.

Beef showmanship awards in the senior division (15 and over) went to Janet Matthews, first; Judy Erway, second; and Jody Spees, third. In the intermediate division (ages 12-14), Louise Crossley was first; Stephanie Carpenter, second; and Joel Kosa, third. In the junior division Allen Cornell was first and Nedra Matthews, second. Janet Matthews was named master showman.

Beef fitting awards in the senior division were earned by Judy Erway, first; Janet Matthews, second; and Jody Spees, third. Intermediate awards went to Louise Crossley, Stephanie Carpenter and Gina Spees, while junior awards went to Alan Cornell and Nedra Matthews. Louise Crossley was named master fitter.

Grand champion Holstein in the junior dairy show was Allegan Bell Diane, a junior 2-year-old, shown by Ken Smoker, Genesee. Reserve champion female was a 3-year-old dry cow, Melcliff Charmcross Vic, shown by Dean Erway of Ulysses.

Kay Smoker took junior champion female and first place blue in the junior heifer class with Allegan Tempo Sheila. Top intermediate heifer and reserve junior champion was A & B Darea Patty Pat, shown by Diane Thompson, Ulysses. Sam Outman, Genesee, showed the top senior heifer calf, So-No-Co Avia Angie. Top junior yearling Holstein heifer was Riss-Dale Elmer Julia shown by Don Gilliland, Genesee.

Jeff Pirrung, Ulysses, had the first place senior yearling heifer, Royle Josh Crown Eliza. Ken Smoker's Allegan Bell Diane was senior champion and top junior two year old. John Angood, Ulysses, had the first place 3-year-old, Ansdale Mountaineer Princess, while Donald Thompson, Westfield, an FFA member, had the top 4-year-old. Dean Erway's FFA animal, Melcliff Charmcross Vic was named the reserve senior champion and first place winner for dry cow 3 years and over.

Grand champion female Ayrshire and senior champion female was Galney R. Julia, shown by Georgia Barker, Ulysses FFA member. Georgia also had the junior champion female, Chestnut Grove Liberal Jenny, a junior yearling which was the reserve grand champion.

The two animals also earned Georgia a first place blue in the dam and daughter class. Karmen Tomb, Ulysses, took first place for a 5-year-old Ayrshire with Ash Avenue Roman's Julia.

Grand champion female Brown Swiss was Conover Hill Dona Gertrudis which also was the first place winner for a dry cow 3 years and over and senior champion female. It was shown by 4-H member Diane Prince, Shinglehouse. Diane also earned a first place blue ribbon in the dam and daughter class and showed the first place senior heifer calf. Her brother, Patrick, took a first place in intermediate yearling heifer.

Grand champion female Jersey was a senior 2-year-old shown by Kevin Kosa, Ulysses, Laureldon Minister Coleen. Kevin's FFA animal was also senior champion female and he also took a first place blue in the dam and daughter class.

Reserve grand champion female and junior champion was Jeremiah Kosa's 4-H animal, a senior heifer calf, EDKO Missy Yolanda Nippersink. Luke Crossley, Coudersport, took a blue ribbon in the junior heifer calf class with Paradise Aaron Anna April who was named reserve junior champion. Kevin Kosa's Minister Noble Maureen took first place in the intermediate heifer calf class. Luke Crossley also took a first place in the 3-year-old class with Laureldon Min Irene.

Clydesdales return to York Fair Sept. 10-14

YORK — The famous Budweiser Clydesdales will be returning to York this summer for parades and demonstrations Sept. 10-14 at the York Intrstate Fair.

Crowds of people, including hundreds of children, lined the streets of downtown York in late May to watch the team of eight draft horses make their way through town pulling the famous red Budweiser wagon.

The draft horses will begin their schedule at the York Fair on Tuesday, Sept. 10, when the stable opens at 10 a.m. The horses will be on display until dark.

On Wednesday, Sept. 11, the team will be hitched up at the stables beginning at 1 p.m., followed by a parade through the fairgrounds at 1:45 p.m.

The team will appear in front of

the grandstand at the fairground's track beginning at 3 p.m. The performances will be repeated at 5:15 p.m., and on Saturday, Sept. 14 beginning at 10:30 a.m.

The Clydesdale breed of horses was originally bred for size, strength, and stamina along the banks of the River Clyde in Lanarkshire, Scotland.

The first Clydesdales were brought to America in the mid 1800s by Canadians of Scottish descent. Their popularity as a work horse peaked during the Civil War era and the years that followed, and today, these "gentle giants" are used primarily for breeding and for show.

To qualify for the world famous eight-horse hitch, a Clydesdale must stand at least six feet high at the shoulder, be a reddish brown

gelding with a black mane and tail, and have a white blaze on the face and four white stockings. And because the team works before millions of adults and excited children each year, each horse must have a gentle temperament.

Each horse weighs about 2,000 pounds, and is fitted with horseshoes that are 20 inches long from end to end and weigh about five pounds each—about twice as long as the shoe worn by a riding horse. (A horse's hoof is made of a nerveless, hornlike substance similar to a fingernail. Shoeing a Clydesdale is no more painful to a horse than a manicure is to a person.)

On an average day, each hitch horse will consume 30 gallons of water, 25 to 30 quarts of feed, and 50 to 60 pounds of hay.

The Budweiser Clydesdales first appeared in 1933, when August A. Busch Jr. bought a team of draft horses for his father to celebrate the end of prohibition. The brewers immediately put the team to work pulling their beer wagons, and today, the Clydesdales are synonymous with Anheuser Busch and Budweiser.

Black and white Dalmations have been constant companions to the horses since the 1950s, originally serving as watchdogs over the horses and wagons along the delivery routes. Now, the dogs ride along in parades atop the red wagons.

The Clydesdale appearances are sponsored by Brewery Products Co. of York. The York Interstate Fair runs Sept. 6-14.
