Included on the program of the day-long session were alternate dairy princess Kelly Kilgore, the Gloryland gospel singers, and featured speaker Dr. Catherine Bene.

Dr. Bene, an eye specialist in the diseases of the retina and vitreous, is the daughter of a county Farm Women member and related having attended the meetings as a child. She is a graduate of Eastern High School and Franklin and Marshall College, served an internship at York Hospital and holds her medical degree from

Temple University.

Her slide presentation explained the latest in treatments for the retina and inner eye, especially problems created as side effects of diabetes. Diabetes, said the eye specialist, is the leading cause of blindness in the under-65 population and second leading cause of sight loss in all ages.

The newest high-tech treatment of such eye problems involves a process called laser photocoagulation. A type of magnifying glass is placed before the eye, and a laser beam directed through it to dissolve blood clot and scar tissue, side effects of diabetes. While some slight vision loss may occur, it is far less than that resulting from allowing diabetic-related eye problems to





