DOYLESTOWN — Bucks County recently celebrated 20 years of involvement in the International 4-H Youth Exchange activities during their annual 4-H Awards Night. The organization also honored its outstanding members and leaders during the event.

Exhibits from various countries that 4-H members in the exchange program have visited included: Japan, Renee Mallowney and David Dickson; United Kingdom, Annette Crooke, Ginny Walton and Gail Crooke; Denmark and Australia, Betsy Crooke; Korea, Judy Foulke; Ireland, Betty Lou Painter; and Germany, Tom Dickson.

The celebration also included a dessert buffet of international foods and a presentation by in-

ternational folk dancers.

During the awards program Arleen Miller, 17, Richboro, and Renee Mallowney, 18, Churchville, were selected as the 1985 Outstanding 4-H'ers and received the Bucks County 4-H Clover Awards.

The Clover Award is based on 4-H involvement and the 4-H'ers' personal development through citizenship and leadership skills.

Arleen Miller has been a 4-H member for nine years in the Seeing Eye Puppy Club. She was selected as the Pennsylvania Dog Care and Training winner and attended the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Arleen has been a volunteer 4-H camp counselor and a state blue ribbon winner in 4-H demonstrations. She is currently

president of the Bucks County 4-H Teen Council.

A senior at Council Rock High School, Arleen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Dickson.

Renee Mallowney was a member of the Richboro 4-H Club for six years. She is the past president of the Bucks County 4-H Teen Council.

During the summer of 1985 Renee visited Japan as a delegate of a special 4-H exchange program. She has been involved in 4-H citizenship programs in Washington, D.C. She is also interested in gardening and was on the winning state 4-H Flower Judging team.

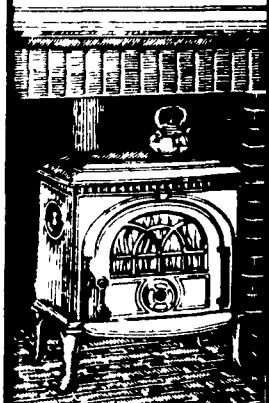
