and covers packing for higher profits, disease and weed control, pepper transplant production, and variety trial results for bell peppers, processing tomatoes and fresh market tomatoes.

The potato program, which runs concurrently, will review activities of the State White Potato Council and look at potassium nutrition,

federal crop insurance, and variety development and yields. Three separate presentations will be held on the Colorado potato beetle, the foremost insect pest of

potatoes in New Jersey.

A dinner show Wednesday evening will include the presentation of awards to those who have made outstanding contributions to the state's vegetable industry.

The vital subject of pest control will be examined beginning at 9:30 a.m. Thursday. Reports will be presented on insects and weeds affecting vegetables, including the 1965 squash and cucumber virus epidemic in the state.

The bedding plant program, to be held the same morning, will cover insect control, growth regulators, and "Getting Started with Plugs," a planting system that has come into use for bedding plants in recent years.

Thursday's general session

begins at 1:45 p.m. and will consider the state vegetable industry's competitive position in future years. Also under discussion will be the federal Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act, skin exposure to pesticides, vegetable fertility and vegetable variety evaluations.

The processing crops program will be held concurrently and cover integrated pest management, freezing of vegetables, tillage problems, the nutrition, culture and spacing of snap beans, and methods of improving plant stands in spinach and other vegetables.

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
