

Substation renamed

NEWARK, DE — The University of Delaware substation in Georgetown has been renamed the College of Agricultural Sciences Research and Education Center on the recommendation of the committee on agriculture of the board of trustees of the university. The board agreed that "substation" did not adequately reflect

the research and educational functions of the facility.

"The new name hasn't changed the thrust of the facility," says Jack Burris, chairman of the committee on agriculture. "We think 'research and education center' is a good description of the programs that take place there every day. The new

title will lend dignity to the center and educated those unfamiliar with it as to the nature of its activities.

In 1941 the university bought 310 acres of land in Sussex County to establish a subunit of the agricultural experiment station in Newark — hence the original name "substation." The center's activities can be divided into five broad categories: evaluating new varieties and strains,

evaluating new agrichemicals, developing new varieties and products, improving management practices, and providing services

and information.

The College of Agricultural Sciences Research and Education Center will continue its

45-year tradition as a research and cooperative extension facility that benefits both urban and rural populations.

NEWARK, DE — The Delaware Cooperative Extension Service will again be conducting field corn and alfalfa integrated pest management (IPM) programs for local farmers during the 1986 growing season.

The field corn program will start in late March with a soil insect survey and continue on a weekly basis through August. Participating growers will receive weekly reports on insect activity, week breaks and disease infestations. In addition, plant population counts and weed mapping will be done at appropriate times. The cost of participating is \$2 per acre for the pest management program—\$3 per acre if soil and leaf tissue samples are also taken. The deadline for registering acreage is February 15.

The alfalfa IPM program will start in early February with a weed survey to help growers make early season weed control decisions. As soon as alfalfa plants become active, stand counts will be taken; subsequent counts will be taken throughout the season. From April through September every field in the program will be visited once a week by a scout. Participating growers will receive regular reports on insect, disease and weed infestation levels, plant stand counts, fertility problems and cutting schedules for use in making timely management decisions. Cost of participating in the alfalfa program is \$3 an acre. The deadline for registering acreage is January 30.

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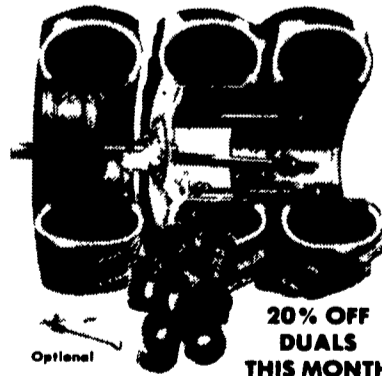
