USDA researchers develop onion variety

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Department of Agriculture is extending the comment period on its Jan. 29 proposal to establish facility and equipment requirements for a new method of poultry inspection.

According to Donald L. Houston, administrator of USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service, the comment period will end April 14. The comment period originally was scheduled to end Feb. 28.

"We received a request from the National Broiler Council to extend the comment period to allow more time to review the proposal and respond to it," said Houston.

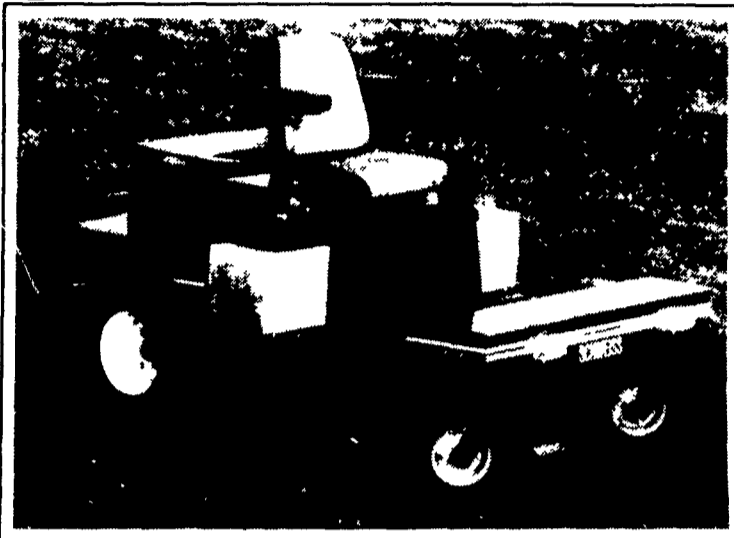

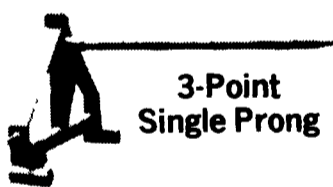

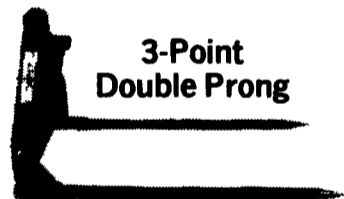

ROUND BALE MOVERS

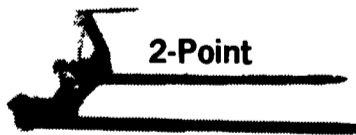


3-Point

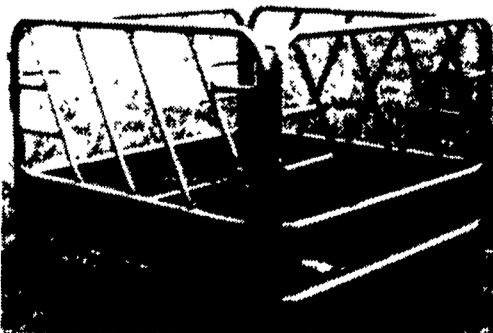

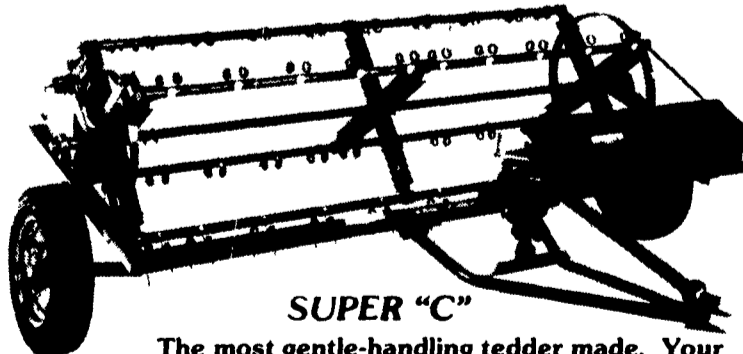
