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spectors who ensure that packing procedures conform to PDA quality specifications.

Finally, state inspectors periodically visit retail outlets to inspect eggs at the consumer level.

Addressing the subject of disease control, Grubb noted that his department's goal is to work

closely with Pennsylvania poultry producers to keep the state as disease-free as possible. Discussing the special avian flu quarantine order invoked by the department earlier this year, Grubb noted that bans on poultry exhibitions and the sale of poultry through auction would be lifted May 17. Futures Market

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"This was a mob response to the problem. It was thought there was widespread damage to the soil," Moore said. Anticipating massive crop destruction, increased speculation drove the market upward, even though the Russians rarely buy from the United States because of the high price of our wheat on the world market, Moore added.

"The Russians were expecting a record crop this year," Moore noted. Even with the radiation damage, which is expected to be less than 3 percent, the crop will still be large, Moore noted.

New Regulations

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Some animals were held due to the controversy on the branding issue and the actual physical branding of cattle takes time and may have delayed the rush, Barr added.

He said clarification has been requested since, to meet the judge's order, contracts would have to be shifted among the periods. This would be in opposition to the judge's request that the program continue without disruption.

It is a concern that farmers will either sell prior to the June 1 deadline to take advantage of the current regulations and depress prices further, or they may wait to see what develops with the new regulations.

Prices were depressed by 20 to 25 percent in April according to Lowell Wilson, secretary of the Pennsylvania Cattlemen's Association. "Dairymen were hurt just as the beefman with the depressed prices; however, it is

not as important to him since it isn't his sole source of income," Wilson said.

The Pennsylvania Association is not joining the NCA and 30 other state associations in their suit against the USDA, Wilson noted, as they realize the important role of the dairy industry in the state. It is their opinion, he continued, that the suit does have merit.

Some beef producers are holding animals that are ready, waiting for the price to rebound. This holding action will continue to depress the price into the summer, Wilson stated.

While the initial drop in the market may have been a psychological, anticipatory reaction, Bergland also noted, "The future market drop is for real and it is lower then it would have been."

Bergland summed up the beef producers' position by explaining, "We are trying to get the best out of a bad situation."

cleaning and disinfecting of poultry hauling equipment would remain in effect, he said.

Grubb had praise for the industry's quick response to the January avian flu outbreak, noting that the state's previous experience aided in minimizing losses during the latest outbreak. "But the virus is still circulating in New York live bird markets," he cautioned, stressing the importance of strict biosecurity measures in keeping the disease at bay.

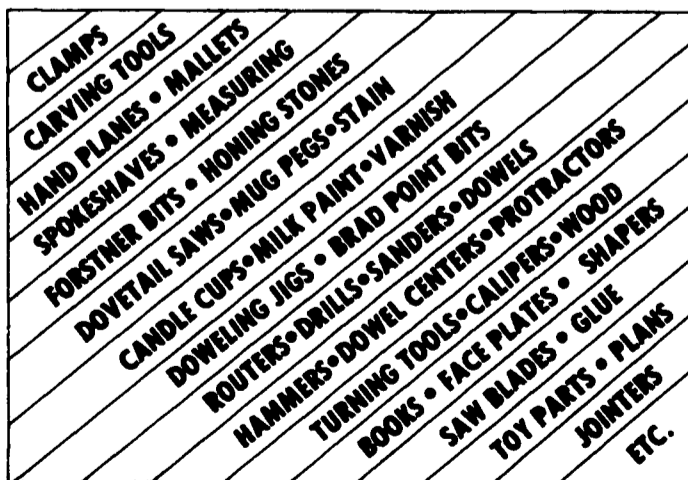
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
