## Scholarships Available to 4-H'ers, Former 4-H'ers

NEWARK, Del. - Cooperative Extension's national 4-H youth committee has established a college scholarship fund to recognize and further the education of worthy current or former 4-H members. Each scholarship is directly related to the National 4-H Awards Program, so outstanding achievement in this program is a prerequisite. Qualified Delaware 4-H'ers and

former 4-H'ers are eligible to compete for the following national scholarships.

• Two \$1,000 4-H career scholarships sponsored by Who's Who Among American High School Students. Scholarships are available to incoming freshmen

(fall '86) in any field of study at an accredited college or university. Applicants must show evidence of 4-H influence on their choice of a future career.

• One \$1,000 agricultural scholarship sponsored by Alpha Gamma Rho. Candidates must be incoming freshman (fall '86) who plan to major in agriculture, forestry, veterinary medicine or a closely related field.

• Four \$1,000 agricultural careers scholarships sponsored by DeKalb Ag Research, Inc. Available to high school seniors or college freshmen who plan to study farming, farm management, business and industry, research

and industry, processing, marketing, advertising or conservation.

four-year \$1,000 • Ten agricultural career awareness scholarships to land-grant institutions, sponsored by E.I. DuPont de Nemours and Company, Inc. Candidates must be high school seniors who are minority members of 4-H and have been accepted by a land-grant institution. They must intend to study agriculture or a closely related field in order to pursue an agriculturally related career.

• Three \$1,000 animal science scholarships sponsored by the Continental Grain Company. Candidates must be juniors

majoring in animal science at an accredited college or university.

 Three \$1,000 dairy goat project scholarships sponsored by the American Dairy Goat Association. These scholarships are available to high school seniors or freshmen at an accredited college who plan to study agriculture, home economics or a closely related field. They must have participated in a 4-H dairy goat project for at least one year.

• One \$1,000 food careers scholarship sponsored by Webster Industries, Inc. Candidates must be freshmen in college who have participated in 4-H food preservation, canning or freezing projects and who plan to major in food technology, food and nutrition, food service or a closely related field.

• One \$3,000 fashion career scholarship sponsored by the Tobe-Coburn School for Fashion Careers. Candidates must have successfully completed 45 quarter or 30 semester hours at an accredited college or university and must be available to enroll at Tobe-Coburn within the year. They must be able to adapt to an urban environment, meet the balance of their financial expenses and submit a brief essay on "Why I Want a Career in the Fashion Industry." The recipient must intend to pursue studies in the fashion industry in order to prepare for a fashion-related career.


