Slaughter steer and heifers ended the week steady; having lost, in trading Wednesday, all of an early week advance. Midweek buyer demand narrowed, following a liberal movement from country areas. Overall finish continued not very attractive. Cows 2.00 higher. Bulls fully steady.

Estimated 5 day receipts 6,100; actuals last week 6,984; year ago 9,661. Steers comprised 48 percent of the week's receipts; Heifers 43 percent; cows 7 percent, feeders 1 percent.

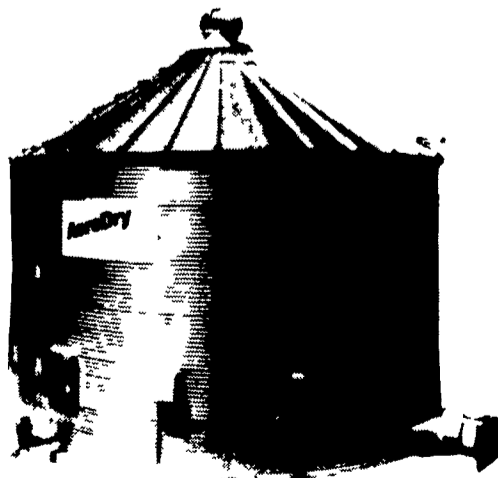
