

Lyng Names Three Agricultural Attaches

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng has named three agricultural attaches to the United Kingdom, Brazil and Australia. The attaches currently holding those positions will be reassigned to Washington.

Robert D. Fondahn will succeed Lynn Abbott as agricultural trade officer to the United Kingdom, where he will be responsible for market development activities.

Joseph F. Somers, the new agricultural officer in Sao Paulo, Brazil, will succeed Paul Hoffman. In his new assignment, Somers will be responsible for agricultural reporting, market development

and trade policy in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, with emphasis on citrus, oilseeds, cotton and tobacco. Somers also will cover agricultural developments in Paraguay.

James V. Parker, who will succeed Dale B. Douglas as agricultural counselor to Australia, will be responsible for agricultural reporting, market development and trade policy in Australia.

Before coming to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service this year, Fondahn served as president of Fondahn and Associates, Inc., McLean, Va. From 1970 to 1984 he

was president of Protein Grain Products International in McLean.

Somers has worked for FAS since 1974. His most recent assignment was chief of the crops branch for international agricultural statistics. Somers' previous overseas assignments included assistant agricultural attache in Buenos Aires, Argentina, from 1979 to 1981, and agricultural officer in Rio de Janeiro from 1981 to 1983.

Parker joined FAS in 1973 as an agricultural economist with the grain and feed division. His previous overseas assignments include agricultural attache in London from 1977 to 1980, and

agricultural counselor in Buenos Aires from 1980 to 1982. His most recent assignment was deputy assistant administrator for commodity and marketing programs.

In fiscal 1985, the United States exported more than \$617 million in agricultural products to the United

Kingdom, more than \$500 million in agricultural products to Brazil and over \$284 million in agricultural products — mostly lumber and horticultural products — to Australia. Also during that time, the United States imported some \$2.4 billion worth of Brazilian agricultural products.

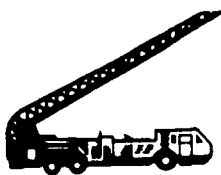
