The festival will feature fun, food and music supplied by Jack Williams and his Country Boys

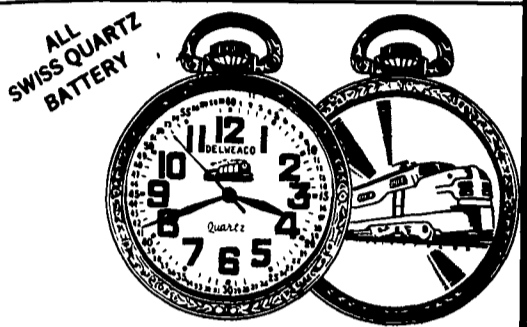
with Warren Mercer. Peaches, ice cream, homemade cakes and other refreshments will be served.

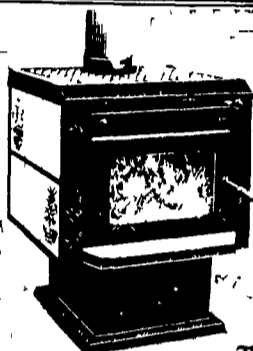

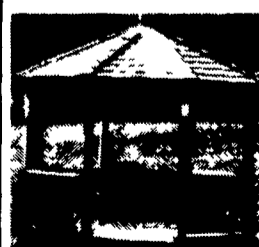
