Steer Is Solanco Fair Overall Champion

QUARRYVILLE — Bob's career as a show steer got off to a slow start one frigid January day in 1985. Beef cattle are made of pretty stout stuff, but when this purebred Angus calf hit the ground the wind chill was hovering between minus 10 and minus 20. Part of Bob's tail

froze and later fell off. The steer's bob-tailed appearance didn't concern his owner, Fritz Frey, who realized full well that consumers couldn't care less about the part that goes over the

fence last. County extension Chester livestock agent, Cheryl Fairbairn must not be very impressed with meticulously sprayed and teased tails, either. Judging the Solanco Fair's steer show on Thursday night, Fairbairn slapped Bob for champion FFA honors before naming him grand champion over the FFA and 4-H beef shows.

The son of Fred and June Frey of Quarryville, 19-year-old Fritz has been a perennial winner at Solanco, as well as at other beef events throughout the county and state. Managing the show and sale cattle at Twin Oak Farms, the family beef operation, has helped him to develop the practiced eye necessary for evaluating show prospects.

Frey's winning steer was a 1200pound homebred entry sired by Continental, a Twin Oak bull and a previous reserve national champion. The young showman wasn't at all deterred by Bob's tail last fall when he selected him for this year's show season. "I liked it," he grinned. "I thought it made him look wider."

And bob-tailed steers might appeal to young showring contenders for yet another reason. "It saved me 10 minutes of fitting time," said Fritz.

Fairbairn went to her champion 4-H steer for reserve grand champion honors. This was the third year of competition for 4-H'er

Jimmy Landis, who campaigned his 1145-pound mediumweight entry named Sirloin to the evening's number-two spot.

The son of James and Linda Landis, Quarryville, Jimmy bought his Chianina-Angus steer from York County cattleman Don Walters at last year's district show and sale.

Also a repeat winner, Landis took grand champion honors in 1984. Some of his stiffest competition often comes from his sister Tracey, who was last year's grand champion exhibitor and came close to repeating the feat by taking reserve honors in the FFA show on Thursday. Her entry was a purebred Angus sired by Independence and bred by Ken Walker of West Chester.

Exhibiting the reserve champion in the 4-H division was Stacey Linton, Kirkwood, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Linton.

Kauffman Repeats '85 Solanco Swine Show Victory

QUARRYVILLE - Spectators at this year's Solanco Fair market hog show may have experienced a bit of deja vu on Thursday afternoon. as last year's judge returned to bestow grand champion honors on a pig bred by the same breeder and shown by the same exhibitor as the 1985 champion.

Once again Beth Kauffman bought her show prospects from York County swine breeder Jim Parlett, and once again she found herself in the winners circle as judge Cheryl Fairbairn singled out her 248-pound Duroc-cross gilt for the grand champion trophy.

The 15-year-old daughter of Robert and Susan Kauffman of Peach Bottom, Beth has been showing hogs at Solanco for six years, but she didn't expect to duplicate last year's performance. "I was really surprised," she beamed after the show.

A Sophomore at Solanco High School, Beth is not associated with either the 4-H or FFA programs.

She credits the fair's many experienced showmen and organizers for helping her learn how to fit and show hogs in her early years.

Rob Rohrer, another veteran swine showman, found himself in the number-two position when Fairbairn singled out his 1 T homebred Hampshire-cross Pipkin named Miss Piggy for reserve grand champion honors.

The son of Robert and Joan Rohrer, Nottingham, the 17-yearold exhibitor has been showing 4-H project hogs for eight years. "This is the best I've ever done," he smiled, adding that, while he often beats his sister, Tiffan, in steer shows, she usually manages to get the edge in hog competitions. Rohrer's 224-pound gilt was also the show's mediumweight champion.

Overall, it was a banner day for the Rohrer family. Rob, Tiffany and their brother, Ryan, brought nine pigs from the family's 90-sow farrow-to-finish operation and came away with numerous

awards. One of Tiffany's three entries was named champion in the lightweight division, and Ryan followed his brother with the reserve champion middleweight.
