## **Short Course Offered**

The first session of the 1986 Delmarva Poultry Nutrition Short Course will be held Wednesday, October 29, at 7:30 p.m. at the University of Delaware Research & Education Center in Georgetown.

Spnsored by the University of Delaware, the Delaware Cooperative Extension System and the Delmarva Poultry Industry, the course will consist of four weekly meetings featuring speakers from industry and university research programs.

Three of the sessions will be held at the Georgetown Center and the fourth will be at the Holiday Inn at Salisbury, Md. Registration is \$20, and the course is open to everyone regardless of race, color, sex, handicap, age or national origin.

The final meeting, November 19, will begin with a social hour followed by dinner. The guest speaker will be Bill Roenigk, director of economic research for the National Broiler Council. He will speak on future marketing and consumption trends.
